Death of George Sweany

It is with sorrow we report the death of our friend and neighbor Mr. George Sweany, which occurred at the hospital in International Falls. George was well and favorably known in Burriss, having some years ago arrived here with his parents from Oregon, while a youth yet in his teens. His father at one time, resided in Burriss on his homestead without a road or building and he alone being the only human being in the township. George possessed many of the combined qualities which go to make a gentleman. Courtesy and integrity were his traits always. The members of his family present were his aged mother late of Oregon, his brother John of Saskatchewan and brother Clarice of Chicago, Ill. A short service was conducted in C. O. F. Hall, Devlin, by Rev. Wright of Emo, after which the Lodge of Foresters, of which Mr. Sweany was a member, took possession of the beautiful oak casket, marching ahead of the hearse. A very large company followed the procession to Burriss cemetery where the remains were tenderly placed beside his little niece Blanche Sweany whose little grave was the first made in the lonely forests of our township. Mother Sweany and family has the sincere sympathy of all.

The subject of this sketch, (which is taken from an Ontario, Canada, newspaper) was the fourth son, of Andrew M. and Belle Sweany, was born in Saunders Co. Neb. March 18, 1883, lived there till

three years old, when the family came to Cottage Grove, and lived on a small farm in the Coast Fork valley, 9 miles south of Cottage Grove till 1899 when the family, except his sister, moved to Emo, Ontario, Canada, where George lived till date of death, April 3, 1912, which occurred very suddenly from pleurisy of the heart only living about 30 minutes, after being stricken.

He leaves to mourn his untimely death an aged mother, who was visiting in Saskatchewan, Bro. J. L. and J. A. of Saskatchewan, T. J. Jr. of Seattle, Wm. H. C. of Chicago Ill., one sister Mrs. J. A. Powell, Cottage Grove, Oregon.

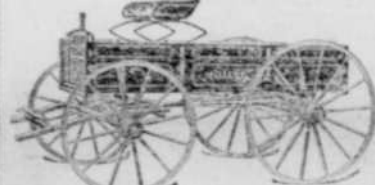

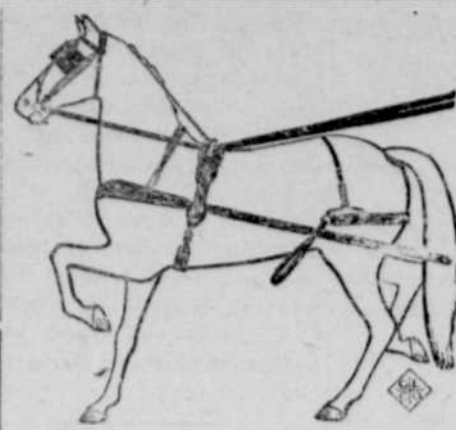
