THIRTY LIVES SAVED

Mate of Wrecked Schooner Goes 110 Miles for Help.

Crew Faces Death on Barren Isle for Eleven Days—Last Chance Wins by Three Hours.

Seattle, Wash.—Bringing Captain Charles Foss and the crew of the cod fishing schooner Joseph Russ, wrecked on Chirikoff Island April 21, the steamship Bertha, of the Alaska Coast company, has arrived in Seattle. Giving a graphic description of the terrific storm which resulted in the loss of the schooner and the death of John Jorgensen, the vessel's first mate, members of the crew of the Russ declared that only for the heroism of A. E. Reeves (Scotty), second mate, and five sailors who went to Chignik in two open boats for assistance, all would have perished. In a terrific gale, with heavy seas breaking over her, the Russ was driven ashore at 6 o'clock in the evening. Grounding on the sand she held her own for several hours, but finally, as the heavy seas continued to pound her, the vessel's hatches gave way and she quickly filled with water. Captain Foss and 34 members of the crew had climbed high in the rigging and lashed themselves to prevent being carried away by the giant waves.

First Mate Jorgensen had started for the main mast to take refuge when a wave hurled him against the side of the vessel. His skull was crushed. Here they hung until 6 a. m., when the storm subsided and the tide left the Russ high and dry. Jorgensen was buried far up on the sandy beach and a wooden cross marks the grave. Captain Foss and his crew built a hut of pine boards and in this they stored the small amount of provisions saved and established sleeping quarters.

It was when the provisions began to run low and they realized that Chirikof Island is uninhabited that Second Mate Reeves and five members of the crew volunteered to put out in two open boats for Chignik, 110 miles distant, for assistance. They were fortunate enough to arrive at that port before the departure of the mail steamer Dora, which immediately proceeded to the rescue. The rescue work was accomplished under great difficulties, as the lifeboats had to be driven through a treacherous surf, while fierce blasts of icy wind swept seaward. To little Scotty, the marvel of the rescue is that had the two boats which put out on what looked like a hopeless errand been three hours later in arriving at Chignik, the 30 men certainly must have perished, as the Dora would have been gone by that time.

USE SIXTH SENSE.

Maxim Would Employ Animals at Sea to Protect Liners.
London—"I am working hard on an idea that, when perfected, will make a disaster like that to the Titanic impossible," said Hiram Maxim. "It is not beyond the realm of science to provide a ship with means of ascertaining whether any icebergs are within 10 miles, even in dense fog, rain or snow storms.

"I am not a spiritualist and I don't believe in any humbug of a superstitious nature, but I do know there are certain animals in the world, having no religion and therefore not superstitious, which can form a clear opinion and, you might say, have definite knowledge of objects in their vicinity without seeing or hearing them—that is, they possess a sixth sense.

"I believe that will be the plan on which mariners will have to rely hereafter, some time or other."

Noted Canvas is "Junk."
Monrovia, Cal.—Drawn by idle curiosity to a junk shop auction in Los Angeles recently, Dr. F. M. Pottenger, of Monrovia, bought for \$100 a painting which pleased his fancy and was later pronounced by connoisseurs a Verboeckhoven masterpiece worth at least \$20,000. Judges of art works declared the painting, a dairy scene, undoubtedly was from the brush of the famous Belgian artist, who died 30 years ago. They averred the painting was probably fifty years old.

Stand Up for Darrow.
Los Angeles—Names of prominent Chicagoans, including ex-United States senators, Federal and state judges, noted lawyers and city officials, were brought into the Darrow case by District Attorney Frederick in the examination of a salesman who formerly had resided in Chicago. All of those mentioned are said to have sworn to depositions regarding the high character and good reputation of the defendant.

Boys Make Biplane and Fly.
Spokane, Wash.—Two Spokane boys, Martin A. Denine and Glen Hemingway, have completed a biplane which this week was given its first successful tryout. An accident marred the initial flight, the machine going wrong after it had sailed 50 feet through the air at an average height of 15 feet. Denine, who was in the machine, was somewhat bruised by the fall.

BIGGEST BRIDGE PLANNED.

Structure Over San Francisco Bay Would Cost \$26,000,000.

San Francisco—A map and plans of the proposed bridge across San Francisco Bay to Oakland, permission to construct which was recently granted by congress to Allan C. Rush, were filed with the board of supervisors.

The roadway will swing 150 feet above the water, hung from ten steel and concrete piers, constituting eight arches. The total suspension will be 17,840 feet, in sections 2230 feet long. Four thousand feet will rest on Yerba Buena Island, which will divide the structure in halves. The San Francisco approach will take off from the summit of Telegraph Hill, which has been reserved by the government for a light station.

Rush estimates the total cost at \$26,000,000. The total cost of the Brooklyn bridge to date, including remodeling for elevated trains and trolley tracks, has been about \$22,400,000, and of the Queensborough bridge, \$17,256,000. The length of the Queensborough bridge, the longest across the East River, is 7449 feet, including approaches, or one mile and 2169 feet. The Oakland bridge will be four miles 720 feet long, of which three miles 2000 feet would be over water.

I. W. W TO RENEW FIGHT.

Force of 500 is Planning to Invade City of San Diego.
Los Angeles—Approximately 500 Industrial Workers of the World will leave Los Angeles for San Diego to renew the "free speech" fight at the conclusion of the demonstration in connection with the burial of Joseph Mikolasek, who died of wounds received in a battle with the San Diego police.

This was the announcement made at a meeting of Industrial Workers of the World, at which arrangements were made for the funeral of Mikolasek. The funeral parade will pass through the principal business streets of the city.

A police permit has been issued, and no trouble is expected. Louis Feyer, of San Diego, who was said to have been selected as grand marshal of the parade, was arrested on a charge of horse-stealing. It is alleged that he stole the horse with which he made the trip from San Diego to Los Angeles.

REFUGEES WITHOUT FUNDS.

Property and Home Stolen or Destroyed in Raids.
Matatlan, Sinaloa, Mexico—The United States transport Buford arrived here write five refugees from Topolobampo and 16 from Altata and Culiacan. At Altata the Buford anchored 17 miles out, the refugees having been transferred by the steamer Luella. The refugees from Culiacan virtually are destitute, their property and homes having been stolen or destroyed in recent rebel raids.

The Buford anchored two miles off this port, 71 adults and 20 children being taken aboard. Of the 20 American children more than 15 were born in Mexico. The transfer of the refugees was witnessed by thousands of Mexicans and the few Americans who remained in Matatlan.

College Cites Seven Wonders.

Ithaca, N. Y.—The seven wonders of the world as selected by the faculty, graduates and seniors of the chemists' seminary at Cornell University, were announced by Professor L. M. Dennis. A few weeks ago the prominent scientific magazines sent a list to Cornell, containing 57 wonders of modern times and requested the chemical department to pick out seven of them as representing the greatest of modern human ingenuity. The seven selected in the order of their importance follow:

Wireless, synthetic chemistry, radium, antitoxins, aeroplanes, Panama canal, telephone.
China to Get \$50,000,000.
Pekin—The minister of finance and the bankers representing the six powers—the United States, Great Britain, France, Germany, Russia and Japan—have arranged the terms of advances to the Chinese government totaling \$50,000,000 against treasury bills redeemable within one year by the proceeds of the loan. It is pointed out by those identified with the scheme that the country is a veritable powder magazine, and the unpaid soldiers threaten an outbreak which can only be avoided by payment of their wages.

Boy Wins at Bread-Making.
Reno, Nev.—The reputation of coeds at the University of Nevada as breadmakers received a severe blow when a male student, competing with 30 girls, won second prize in the bread-making contest. Harold Manion, of Portland, Or., a sophomore registered in the department of agriculture, was the successful competitor and it was only by a close margin that he missed receiving the first award.

Hydro-Cycle Crosses Bay.
San Francisco—A novelty in navigation was introduced here when Eugene Frey, an inventor, rode across San Francisco Bay on his home-made hydromotorcycle. The distance from the starting point in Alameda over Frey's circuitous course to the dock in this city was 12 miles and the queer-looking craft was just one hour on the way.

IT GRATES ALL THE NUTMEG

New York Man's Invention Will Save Housewife From Grating Off Fingernails.
A nutmeg grater that grates all the nutmeg, down to the last scrap, has been designed by a New York man. It also saves the housewife from grating off her fingernails and the tips of her fingers. The grater proper is circular and is affixed to a wooden handle.



Pivoted to the center is a revolving handle resembling a miniature motor man's controller, with a little cup in one end to hold the kernel and a spring cap to keep it in place and press it against the grater plate. The nutmeg is placed in this cap and the handle turned until the desired amount is ground off, the operation being much speedier than when kernel has to be rubbed across the grater by hand. Furthermore, the hand method results in waste, as after the nutmeg has been ground so small that it cannot be scraped without scraping the fingers as well, it has heretofore had to be thrown away.
