A NEW LEVIATHAN OF THE SEAS

The Emperor, a new sister ship
of the Titanic was launched at
Hamburg last week. She will be
equipped with life boats to accom-
modate every passenger, will carry
three wireless operators' on eight
hour shifts and her dynamos will
be above her water line. So much
for the lesson of the Titanic.

The Emperor is designed to
eclipse all previous records of
ocean greyhounds for size and
splendor. She is to be about 20
feet longer than the Olympic and
her sister ship, the ill-fated Titanic,
and will have a displacement ex-
ceeding those vessels by about
5000 tons. The length of the Em-
peror over all will be 900 feet,
and when complete and fully
laden she will displace about 50,-
000 tons. There will be eleven
decks on the new liner, and she
will be fitted out in the most luxu-
rious style.

The decks of the new liner will
have the beam of Broadway, New
York's leading thoroughfare, at
its widest part—96 feet. Nine of
her eleven decks will be above the
water line, equal to the height of
the largest apartment houses. If
the Emperor were set up on end
beside the cathedral of Cologne,
the famous tower would come only
to the second funnel of the steam-
ship. Nearly 2,000,000 feet of
Oregon fir were used for the decks
alone.

New Zealand Results

New Zealand has drawn the eyes
of the world to her extension of
government ownership and control,
and operation of her natural re-
sources.

A dispatch from Wellington says
that Mr. Mackenzie, the prime
minister of New Zealand, speaking
at Auckland, said that the year
ending March 31, last, had been
"a record financially." Revenue
of the islands was \$53,828,000 and
expenditures \$50,324,000.—sur-
plus therefore \$3,504,000. The
government investments were re-
turning more than sufficient to pay
the interest on all moneys borrow-
ed, both in New Zealand and
abroad: Treasury bills—short term
government bills—to the amount
of \$3,500,000 had been paid off out
of revenue in the last few years.
Alarmists had commented, said
Mr. Mackenzie, on the closeness
between exports and imports. But,
during the last twenty years ex-
ports exceeded imports by \$300,-
000,000, and the internal wealth
of the country had increased by
\$1,022,000,000.

The white inhabitants of New
Zealand number 1,050,000. But
the export and import trade last
year amounted to \$200,000,000.
The state is taking up all the water
powers, and is spending \$25,000,-
000 a year on their development.
But the state's enterprise is to be
only self-supporting. The indi-
rect advantage is to come from ex-
tended and profitable industry.

Immigration is carefully select-
ed, so that 98 1-2 per cent of their
immigrants are of British origin.
They have universal suffrage. The
late premier says that woman suf-
frage has shown no series change
politically, but that socially, and
in the home, it has done a great
deal of good.

The government controls all
great institutions—railways, tele-
graphs and telephones, mines,
roads. The state lending depart-
ment has advanced about \$70,000,-
000 and applications for loans not
exceeding \$2433 have priority over
larger sums, the limit being \$14,-
600. Rate of interest is five per
cent.

Old age pensions are paid, and
\$30 is contributed by the govern-
ment towards expenses on the birth
of every child.
