THE OREGON HEN ENROUTE

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COL-
LEGE, CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 23—
A new activity of the extension
division of the Oregon Agricultural
College is about to be launched,
when a poultry demonstration car
is sent out, to travel over the
Southern Pacific lines.

In consultation with Assistant-
General Freight Agent Lounsbury,
and State Superintendent of
Schools Alderman, Prof. Hetzel,
director of extension at the college,
will make out the itinerary of the
car, and arrange to have the
school children in each town where
the car stops dismissed for that
day, that they may attend the lec-
tures and demonstrations.

The car will arrive in Corvallis
about March 15, and Prof. James
Dryden of the college will equip it,
probably using much of the material
shown in the egg production
exhibit at the close of farmers' week.
During the trip C. C. Lamb,
foreman of the college poultry
plant, with an assistant, will be in
charge, and will deliver the lec-
tures. The Southern Pacific Rail-
road has agreed to carry the car
without expense to the college over
all its lines, attaching it to regular
trains, and leaving it at the sta-
tions scheduled. The car will be
sent out April 1.

KITCHEN WEIGHTS AND MEASURES

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COL-
LEGE, CORVALLIS, ORE., Feb. 23
—The following valuable table of
weights and measures for kitchen
use has been prepared by the do-
mestic science department of the O-
regon Agricultural College:

3 teaspoons.....equal 1 tablespoon
12 tablespoons (liquid).....1 cup
16 tablespoons (dry).....1 cup
2 cups.....1 pint
2 tablespoons butter.....1 ounce
4 tablespoons flour.....1 ounce
2 tablespoons gran. sugar.....1 ounce
2 tablespoons liquid.....1 ounce
1 square Baker's chocolate.....1 ounce
Juice of lemon.....3 tablespoons
4 cups sifted flour.....1 pound
2 cups granulated sugar.....1 pound

FOR PERMANENT DISPLAY

Action taken by the Commer-
cial Club at its meeting Monday
night may result in the creation of
a place for the permanent display
of the grains, grasses, forage
plants, minerals, fruits, etc., pro-
duced in this immediate section.

This action was brought about
by the arrival of the exhibit pro-
vided for the eastern land shows
by Felix Currin—an exhibit which
created wonder and amazement
among people who have not been
educated to the great possibilities of
the Willamette Valley as a field
for agricultural enterprise, and
which, if properly displayed here,
would present an argument to pro-
spective settlers which would be
more conclusive than any talk or
literature possible.

This exhibit of grains, grasses
and forage plants was produced
entirely on Mr. Currin's ranch
near Cottage Grove, and embraces
1500 varieties, all of excellent
quality. There are 57 varieties of
barley alone.

Add to this feature the fruit and
minerals, and the display would be
one not surpassed by any town in
Oregon.
