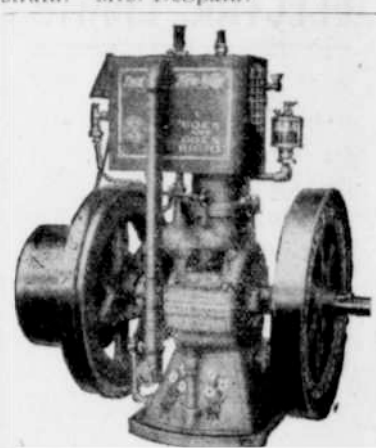

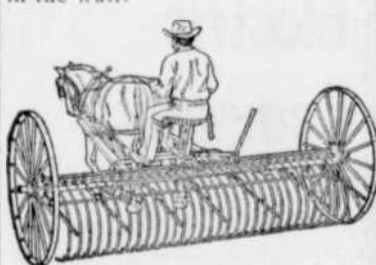

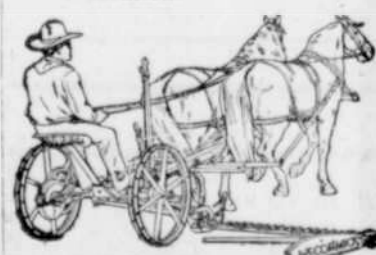

BERRY GROWING SUCCESS IN LANE

A visit to the Puyallup valley will convince any one that berry culture is a fine way to pass time and a profitable way to spend life.

Let me give you a few plain facts, then lets address ourselves to the situation and become as famous as the Puyallup valley.

There is nothing to prevent but laziness and skepticism. Let's take our isolated case that can be duplicated hundreds of times in the same valley.

A Mr. Davis showed me his home of three acres—just begun. A quarter of an acre was all he was able to put to raspberries at first. They were set in April. March will be better here. The following year he gathered more than 22 crates from the fourth of an acre. The second year he gathered 151½ crates from the same vines. The third year he only got 146¼ crates as frost caught him.

This year he is sure to get from 200 to 250 crates from the same vines. He has two acres more that will bear the first time this year.

For five years the growers of the valley have averaged \$1.74 per crate. They are sure of a dollar a crate at the cannery.

Let's base our calculations on the dollar and the 200 crates instead of \$1.74 and 250 crates. That will make \$800 per acre after the second crop, if the frost does not catch them. Calculate on the basis that has for five years been their average and you have for 800 crates \$1,392 per acre.

Mr. Davis is working for wages and improving his three acres as he can. He said, "One more year after this and I will be independent, then I will live at home and board at the same place."

How can this be done? More than one said to me, you can't raise berries successfully without cows and chickens. Cows to furnish fertilizer and chickens to keep the land clean and catch the insects that harm the fruits. But you may have all these, then fail. No success crowns the growers unless they are organized. No berry organization is complete without a cannery owned and controlled by the growers. There are many details to be worked out.

Say friends lets organize. No better time than now. Begin now to plan for your berry plants and get your ground ready. Get your cows and chickens, etc.
