BALLOT WILL BE

NINE-FOOT AFFAIR
 Forty-five measures go before
 the voters of Oregon at the Novem-
 ber election, thirty-eight effecting
 those of the entire state. Below
 we give the complete list of said
 measures, filed and arranged sub-
 stantially as they will appear on
 the ballot.

PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION
 Equal suffrage amendment ex-
 tending the right of suffrage to
 women. Filed December 29, 1910.

REFERRED TO THE PEOPLE BY THE
 LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

For constitutional amendment of
 section 8, article V, for the purpose
 of creating the office of Lieutenant
 Governor, etc. Filed February 1,
 1911.

For an amendment of section 1,
 article IX, of the Oregon constitu-
 tion, providing for a uniform rule
 of taxation, except on property
 specifically taxed, etc. Filed Feb-
 ruary 17, 1911.

For an amendment of section 32,
 article I, Oregon constitution, for
 the purpose of permitting taxes to
 be levied upon different classes of
 property at different rates, etc.
 Filed February 17, 1911.

For constitutional amendment to
 repeal all of section 1a of article
 IX, except that part prohibiting
 poll and head taxes in Oregon,
 etc. Filed February 17, 1911.

For amendment of section 1 of
 article XVII of the constitution so
 as to require for the adoption of
 any proposed constitutional amend-
 ment a majority vote of all the
 electors voting at such election,
 instead of a majority of those vot-
 ing on the amendment only. Filed
 February 21, 1911.

For constitutional amendment of
 section 3, article VI, of the consti-
 tution, making stockholders in
 banking corporations liable to pay
 for the benefit of depositors an
 amount equal to the par value of
 the stock held by any stockholder
 in addition to having originally
 paid the par value thereof. Filed
 March 7, 1911.

REFERENDUM ORDERED BY PETITION OF THE PEOPLE.

An act appropriating \$75,000
 for building and equipping an ad-
 ministration building and extend-
 ing heating plant to same; and
 also appropriating the sum of
 \$153,258.92 for the purpose of ad-
 ditional lands, equipment and
 apparatus, making repairs, addi-
 tional improvements, additions,
 paying salaries of instructors and
 employes, etc., for the University
 of Oregon. Filed May 18, 1911.

An act appropriating \$175,000
 for the construction, equipment
 and furnishing of a modern library
 and museum building, and extend-
 ing the heating plant to same, for
 use of the University of Oregon.
 Filed May 18, 1911.

An act vesting the Railroad
 Company with power and jurisdic-
 tion to supervise and regulate every
 public service corporation and
 utility in the state of Oregon, as to
 the adequacy of the service render-
 ed and facilities provided, the fair-
 ness of rates, tolls and charges to
 be collected from the public there-
 for, etc. Filed May 18, 1911.

An act appropriating \$50,000
 for building, furnishing and equip-
 ping a dormitory at the Oregon
 Normal school at Monmouth. Filed
 May 18, 1911.

PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION
 For a law to create the County
 of Cascade out of the eastern por-
 tion of Clackamas County, and
 provide for its organization. Filed
 June 26, 1912.

For an act levying an annual
 tax of six-tenths of a mill on the
 dollar on all the taxable property
 of the college purposes, and to pro-
 vide for the government of such
 institutions. Filed June 29, 1912.

For an amendment of section 1
 of article IV of the constitution of
 Oregon, providing no measure sub-
 mitted to the people at any election
 under the initiative shall take
 effect or become the law unless it
 shall be approved by a majority of
 all electors voting at such election.
