SCHOOL BOND ISSUE IS ABLY DISCUSSED

Editor Leader:—

It is not a matter of the province, authority or competency of the school board of Cottage Grove in submitting to the legal voters the proposition of \$40,000 bonds for a high school building. A signed petition filed with the board demands an election, and the question will be submitted March 29th.

Those who are best informed know that there is urgent demand for increased high school facilities. The present building is crowded to capacity. There are 12 in the graduating class and 52 in the class for promotion into the high school, making a net gain of 40 in the high school for next year. This does not take account of the increase in population and those from the outside who will ask admission into our school.

But that is not all. Every room in the grade department is full, and no preparation for the increased attendance due each year.

What shall we do with the overflow? It is simply a question of rent or build.

The school board, after consideration, recommends that such proposed building be erected on the present east side school grounds; that a committee of three, consisting of one person from the city council, one from the commercial club and one from the local grange, be appointed to act in conjunction with the school board in selecting suitable plans and in erecting such building, and that the plans of the Dallas high school be submitted to the school board and committee for consideration.

A public mass meeting will be called at the Armory Friday night to discuss all phases of this question.

All other towns are meeting their high school requirements, and we must measure up to our duties and responsibilities, or fall far below the standards in education. Nothing less than an adequate high school can be maintained.

Desirable citizens will shun our city as a plague unless the best educational facilities are provided. The present demand is no fad or fancy, but a pressing need.

Greedy for gain without generosity for education is disdainful in any individual or community.
