Mrs. Warren M. Sutton, a daughter of the late W. H. Lincoln of this city, died at Burns, Oregon, April 3, 1913, after having submitted to a surgical operation, aged 44 years. Belle Lincoln was born in Massachusetts March 13, 1869, and came to Oregon with her parents and located in Cottage Grove 23 years ago. She was united in marriage to Prof. Warren M. Sutton March 12, 1896, who, together with an aged mother and two sisters, survive her, the sisters being Mrs. Frank King and Mrs. Dennis Slagle of this place. Prof. and Mrs. Sutton have long been engaged in educational work and ranked among the foremost teachers in this section of the state. Both had a wide acquaintance and they were universally esteemed. The many Lane county friends of Prof. Sutton extend him and other members of the family their sincere sympathy in their sad bereavement. Funeral services were conducted from the M. E. church in this city Sunday afternoon by Rev. E. C. Wigmore, of Springfield, interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.
