**BOHRNSTEDT BRANDED A FRENZIED FINANCIER**

**He Declares Creswell Orchard Company is Solvent and Courts Suit**

Portland, Ore., April 14.—Characterizing A. C. Bohrnstedt, of Salem, and controlling head of half a dozen land companies as a "frenzied financier" and alleging that Bohrnstedt had fleeced numbers of Oregon land buyers out of thousands of dollars by illegal manipulations of incorporations he organized and controlled, Herbert Haid, today explained why he, as trustee of the insolvent A. C. Bohrnstedt Orchards company, yesterday filed suit at Salem to compel Bohrnstedt and his associates to account for more than \$100,000 of the company's funds.

The moneys, Haid alleges in the complaint, was procured by transferring properties and equity in Lane county lands, held by the A. C. Bohrnstedt company, to the A. C. Bohrnstedt Orchard company, at a figure which represented approximately \$100,000 in water. Both concerns, it is alleged, were controlled by Bohrnstedt at the time.

In furtherance of his alleged illegal schemes, Haid declared that Bohrnstedt organized and purchased several county banks in Oregon and unloaded papers held by his companies on the banks. Then after milking the institutions dry in this manner he disposed of them to innocent purchasers.

In this manner it is alleged Bohrnstedt was enabled to realize on paper that he otherwise would not have been able to secure funds on, and the bank stockholders have been placed in position where they have had to stand the consequent loss, which they have done.

"The suit filed Saturday against Bohrnstedt and his subsidiary companies is the result of about a year's investigation and effort to straighten out the tangle in which the A. C. Bohrnstedt Orchard company was found to be," said Haid.

"It seems that Bohrnstedt has had a special mania for the organizing of incorporations, evidently for the purpose of confusing people, and thereby reap large benefits for himself. He originally comes from Galesville, Wis., and in 1903 he began this frenzied finance career by organizing an elevator company, being at that time the head of a bank which he had organized at Caddot, Wis. It is reported on the failure of the elevator company the bank suffered considerably.

"Later on he organized the A. C. Bohrnstedt Co. at Minneapolis. This company proceeded to acquire options and contracts on lands, apparently for the express purpose of inflating the values, and then organizing subsidiary companies for the purpose of purchasing these same options and contracts at a large advance over the price paid for the same.  
"In the case of the A. C. Bohrnstedt Orchard company, which he organized, he followed this plan.

**CONTRACTS ARE ACQUIRED.**  
"In the spring of 1909 he, as a representative of the parent company acquired contracts and options to purchase from several farmers near Creswell, Or., a number of farms aggregating approximately 1400 acres at an average cost of \$60 to \$70 per acre or a total of about \$90,000. He made about \$12,000 in first payments and during the same period there were sales made to about 28 different purchasers of 5 and 10 acre tracts on five year contracts at an average price of about \$400 an acre. These payments aggregated \$19,000, which is \$7000 more than had been paid on the purchase price of the same land.

**CAPITALIZED AT \$150,000.**  
"The parent concern is capitalized at \$100,000 and the A. C. Bohrnstedt Orchard company, which has been encumbered to its full value, is capitalized at \$150,000.

"After the creditors of the latter company were informed of the condition of affairs, an indignation meeting was held at the Osburn hotel in Eugene, about a year ago, which developed in my appointment as trustee. A deed of trust was executed by the company to me on August 1, 1912, since which time I have succeeded in disposing of about 50 per cents of the assets and liabilities. In justice to the creditors and upon the advice of my attorneys, I am at the present time suing Mr. Bohrnstedt, his

parent company and his associates for the return of the amount shown by the books which was exacted evidently by conspiracy of the A. C. Bohrnstedt Orchard company by the A. B. Bohrnstedt Co. This amount is approximately \$100,000."

**CLAIMS COMPANY IS SOLVENT.**  
Declaring he welcomed the suit brought by Herbert Haid, trustee of the A. C. Bohrnstedt Orchard company, to compel him and his associates to account for approximately \$100,000, funds of the orchard concern, A. C. Bohrnstedt, controlling head of the company and organizer of half a dozen other land and farming companies, has denied allegations of "frenzied finance" fraud and conspiracy made by Haid in the complaint.

Asserting that the orchards company is solvent, despite Haid's declaration to the contrary, and that every dollar can be accounted for and will be at the proper time.

In regard to Haid's charge that Bohrnstedt bought out several county banks, then loaded them with paper of his companies in exchange for actual cash, Bohrnstedt acknowledged that "some paper" had been sold to the banks in question, but that the people who later bought the institutions had full knowledge of the fact that these papers were listed as assets. Much of this paper was later ordered off the books by Bank Examiner Wright, which order was complied with, and the banks are now said to be on sound footing.

**Passing of a Lorane Pioneer.**

Richard Crow was born in St. Charles county, Mo., March 15, 1833, and died at Lorane, Ore., April 9, 1913, at the ripe old age of 80 years and 25 days.

In youth he emigrated from Missouri with his parents to Iowa, where he resided until the spring of 1851, when he was seized with the California gold fever and with a party, consisting of a brother-in-law and friends, started for California, reaching the Sacramento Valley in the fall, after a long and weary six months' trip with ox team across the plains. In the spring of 1852 his father and family started for the sunset land. The following October, "Diek," as he was called, joined them near Portland, reaching Lorane Valley, (then known as the Siuslaw) in July, 1853. Here he took up a donation claim, on which he lived continuously until death. On Sept. 1, 1857, he was married to Sarah J. Thrush, who survives. To this union were born fifteen children, of whom eleven are still living. They are: Mrs. Cynthia Allen, J. N. and Orville, of Lorane; Nathan and Frank, of Yoncalla; B. G. and Mrs. Elman Bainbridge, of Cottage Grove; Mrs. Emma Matthews, Mrs. Laura Lyle, Mrs. Lena Yoe, of Pullman, Wash. In early manhood, Mr. Crow united with the Methodist Episcopal church, dying, as he lived, a modest, painstaking, Christian man. The funeral was held from the M. E. church at Lorane, conducted by his pastor, Rev. F. W. Snyder. The body was laid to rest in the Crow family cemetery. X

**BIG TIMBER SALE IN SOUTH IDAHO**

Washington, April 18.—The Department of Agriculture has begun advertising two large tracts of timber which aggregate 750 million feet on the Payette River within the Boise and Payette National Forests, Idaho. The District Forester at Ogden, Utah, will receive bids up to and including June 1, 1913, and for an additional month if intending purchasers wish more time to examine the timber before deciding on their bids.

While the bids received through competition will determine the rate at which the timber will be sold, the Department, as the result of careful study, has placed a minimum price which will be considered on the timber, according to species and situation. These prices range from \$2.50 a thousand feet for western yellow pine in the most accessible places, down to \$1.00 for the least valuable and least accessible timber. The initial rates will be subject to readjustment in 1913 and in 1922. By such readjustment the stumpage price may be modified twice at four-year intervals during the twelve years which will be allowed for the removal of the timber.

The Department officials point out that, in sales of such a large quantity of timber, it is neces-

sary to allow a long term of contract because of the magnitude of operation and investment. The fact that many large sales have been made with readjustment clauses indicates, it is held, that timber operators find the method businesslike and practicable.

The timber to be cut lies on the watersheds of the south and middle forks of the Payette, and bids will be received for any or all of the timber on either fork. It is accessible to southern Idaho, which is developing rapidly and in which the demand for timber will increase.

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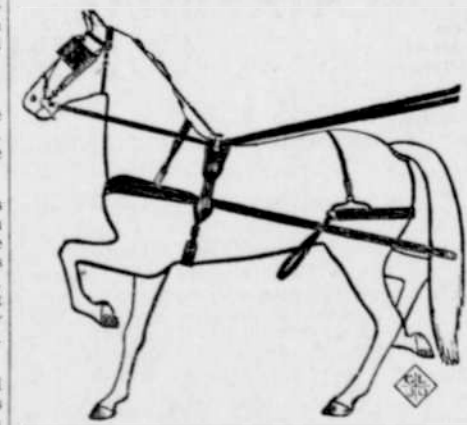
