CANNERY ASSOCIATION PERFECTS ITS PLANS

At a meeting of the Grange and Commercial Club committees last week, the capital stock of the newly organized cannery association was fixed at \$3,000, divided into six hundred shares, at \$5 each. The by-laws provide that not more than three shares shall be owned or controlled by one person, and this stock is non-assessable. It is thought little trouble will be experienced in placing the stock.

The new enterprise promises to develop rapidly from now on, and definite arrangements for buildings and equipment will be made at an early date.

STATEMENT AND PLEDGE.

We, the undersigned, citizens of Cottage Grove and South Lane County, do hereby pledge ourselves to become members of an association for the promotion of our mutual interests along all the various lines of fruit growing, farming and dairying, the following being a summary of the aims and purposes of the association and of the methods of its organization and government:

NAME.

The name of this association shall be the Cottage Grove Fruit-growers' Association.

PURPOSES.

The object and purposes for which this association is formed are:

First: To encourage, promote and engage in the business of fruit raising and farming, to which end the association shall gather and place at the service of its members any and all available information as to the varieties of fruits, vegetables and grains best adapted to this locality, as well as the latest and most approved methods of their cultivation.

Second: To buy, sell, ship and deal in any and all kinds of fruits, vegetables and farm products and the articles manufactured therefrom.

Third: To manufacture such articles by evaporating, extracting, cooking, compounding and otherwise.

Fourth: To buy, sell, manufacture, ship and deal in any and all kinds of materials and articles necessary or proper to be used in, about or in connection with such business.

Fifth: To do any and all things necessary and pertinent to the conducting of the business of said association in any and all of its branches.

CAPITAL STOCK.

The capital stock of the association shall consist of 600 shares of the par value of \$5 (five dollars) each, of which no stockholder shall be permitted to own more than three shares. And it is agreed that the shares are to be non-assessable.

GOVERNMENT AND MANAGEMENT.

The government of this association shall vest directly in the stockholders, for which purpose each stockholder shall be entitled to but one vote. The management of the business of the association shall be through a board of nine trustees elected by the stockholders, three of whom, after the first year, shall be chosen annually.

AGREEMENT.

We, the undersigned, do further pledge ourselves to become stockholders in this association and to take the number of shares of stock set opposite our names, and for which we agree to pay the par value within thirty days from notice by the executive committee that the required amount of stock has been pledged:

With renewed operations in the logging camps and saw mills, the building of new county macadam roads leading into Cottage Grove from the north and south, the paving of a mile of streets and the building of a \$40,000 brick high school building, Cottage Grove will be the scene of much activity this season.

Part of the knowledge gained at a recent commercial club meeting by the writer was how to grow alfalfa, not on our chin, but on our back lot. Clover, we understand, can also be grown here by first turning a lot of microbes loose on the selected tract, sowing the seed, and then working up a degree of "enthusiasm." With a movement started having for its object the turning of the tourist travel from Eugene over the Natron Road by way of Klamath Falls to California and from California to Portland over the same route, Roseburg and other Southern Oregon towns are beginning to take a little more interest in some of the deplorable roads of that section of the state. Cottage Grove has for years been credited with shamefully neglecting the highway leading into this city from the south through Pass Creek canyon, when it belongs to Douglas county and over which Cottage Grove and Lane County has no jurisdiction. We understand the Douglas county court has recently set aside an appropriation of \$5,000 for the improvement of the Pass Creek highway. If something is not done with that road soon it will be discarded as a part of the Pacific Highway which will either go from Eugene to Natron and Klamath, or else from Cottage Grove up the Coast Fork by way of London Springs and down, the south slope of the Calapooya mountains to Oakland.

Street Contracts Awarded.

An important meeting of the city council was held Monday evening, at which time bids for the hard surface paving of Fifth, Seventh, Ninth and Birch streets were opened and considered. The bid of Ambrose & Burdall, of Portland, was 95 cents per square yard, 4 cents below their successful bid of last year. H. Venske's bid was \$1.09 per square yard. The bids were referred to the street committee for final disposition. This contract aggregates about a mile of paving and will be a great improvement to the city.

COTTAGE GROVE HIGH TEAM DOWNS EUGENE

The Cottage Grove high school base ball team defeated the Eugene Y. M. C. A. team Friday in a one-sided game. Eugene was on the short end of the 15 to 8 score all through the game. The hard hitting local boys found the Eugene pitchers to their liking and hit the ball hard and often, while on the other hand, Atkinson and Cellers pitched good class ball and with perfect support would have won a shut-out game. Credit is due Smith, the local 8th grade catcher, for the way he handled Cellers' fast shoots after Sears retired on account of a sore hand. Return game will be played at Eugene soon.

Discuss County Road Building.

Judge Thompson and County Commissioner Hawley were in town Monday conferring with citizens and road supervisors in regard to the proposed new county road into Cottage Grove from the Rock Crusher to the Cochran ford, and thence into town by way of Ninth Street, also the change of Pacific Highway from the mill dam south to the Latham railroad bridge on higher ground, Alex Spare agreeing to give 30 feet more ground for this purpose, with certain restrictions. Mr. Hawley remained until evening and attended a meeting of the commercial club when these propositions were thoroughly discussed and both propositions strongly favored.

W. W. Hawley, of Lorane, was also present and presented a proposition to change the Lorane road to Cottage Grove slightly at a certain point, thereby cutting out a steep grade. A committee of six was appointed as follows: C. W. Wallace, A. L. Woodard, A. H. Powell, B. S. Swengel, F. B. Phillips and G. M. Hall, to view these proposed road improvements and make recommendations to the county court early next week, and if granted by the court, all of these improvements will be made this season.
