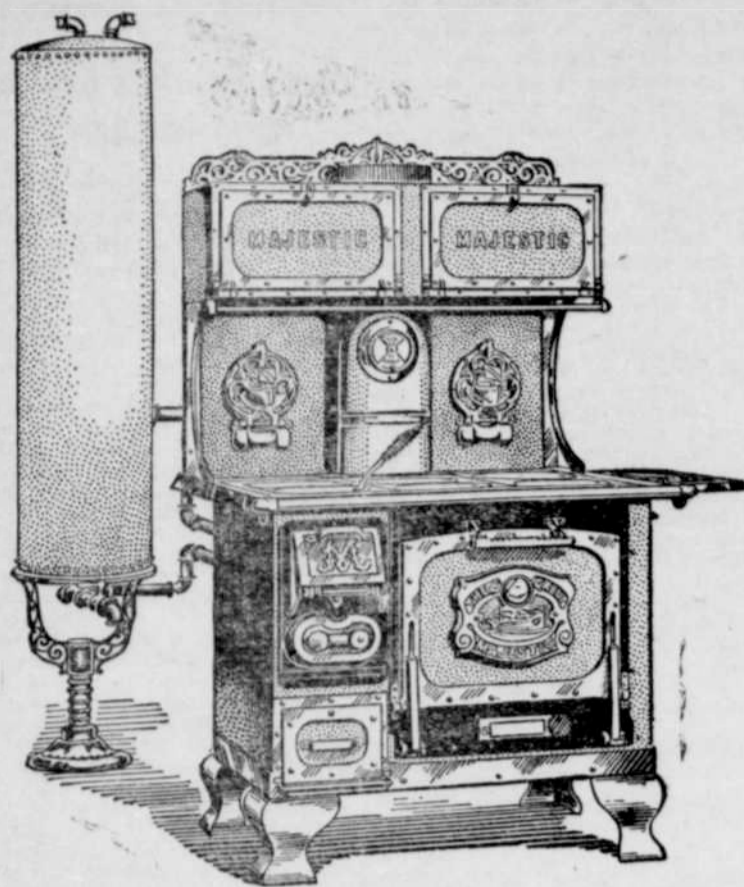

The Loganberry in Douglas.

A praiseworthy movement toward the industrial development of Douglas County is planting of 500 acres to loganberries in the Sutherlin Valley, with the expectation of increasing this to 1500 acres in the next year or two. An organization has also been formed at Glendale for the growth of this luscious berry on an extensive scale in that locality. This prolific and fine flavored berry is constantly growing in popularity, and with proper care brings quick and lucrative returns. It is now proposed to also place the juice on the market in a manner similar to grape juice. This is also increasing the demand for loganberries, and growers located near shipping points will doubtless be able to realize handsomely from their growth. These berries will ripen here at least ten days earlier than elsewhere in the state.—Roseburg Review.

OBITUARY

Attorney Jerome Knox died at the home of his sister, Mrs. Laura McFarland, in this city Sunday evening, May 11, 1913, aged 58 years, 5 months and 6 days, of cancer. Mr. Knox was born in Cottage Grove, Dec. 5, 1854. He was educated in the district school near Cottage Grove, and graduated from Monmouth College in 1874 with high honors. He engaged in printing and newspaper work for a few years and then entered the Law College of the University of Kentucky from which he graduated in 1877. He taught school for a while at Paisley, after which he engaged in the practice of law at Lakeview. In 1881 he received the appointment of receiver in the United States Land Office at Lakeview, which position he creditably and efficiently filled for a term of four years, after which he again took up the practice of law. He was a successful practitioner for many years. He received the republican nomination for joint representative for Klamath and Lake county in 1886, which he declined. He attended as a delegate several state conventions of the republican party and served as the first city attorney of Lakeview and served for several years as Lake county attorney for the State Land Board. He also served as deputy district attorney at Lakeview, and was the principal attorney in the opening of the celebrated Warner Valley land grants. He returned to Cottage Grove a few years ago broken in health, and for the past two years has been residing on a homestead in Crook county, Oregon. He recently underwent two or three surgical operations for cancer of the throat but received no relief. Mr. Knox was a genial, whole-souled gentleman and had a host of friends in this city and in Lake county. Funeral services were conducted from the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Henry McFarland today, Tuesday, at 3 o'clock, by Rev. J. T. Moore of the M. E. church, interment in the Masonic cemetery. Four sisters survive him, Mrs. Laura McFarland, Mrs. Frona McFarland, Mrs. J. M. Morss, Mrs. Josiah Callison, and a half-sister, Mrs. H. C. Veatch.

Mrs. Ves Wallace received the sad intelligence Monday of the death of her father, S. B. Light, at his home at Stockton, Calif., aged 73 years. He was a member of the M. E. church and was prominent in the affairs of his county and city. He leaves a wife by a second marriage and five daughters and one son, all of whom reside in California, except Mrs. Wallace.

the ground may be plowed by someone else.

4. There must be a statement accompanying each exhibit, as to age, and to the effect that the exhibit was prepared by the exhibitor, signed by the parent or guardian.

5. No pupil shall make more than one entry in each competition.

6. In case there is no competition, the premium will be awarded at the discretion of the awarding committee.

7. If the exhibitor wishes his exhibit sent to the State Fair, he should leave directions to that effect, in order that same may be shipped in time to reach the Fair Grounds by Sept. 27th. Entries must be made on blanks furnished by the secretary of the State Fair at Salem, and mailed so as to reach him not later than Sept. 22, 1913.
