Discusses the "Cedar Rust."

EDITOR LEADER:

In answer to many who have asked about the so-called "cedar rust" on the pear, I have this to say. In the first place, a well-known inspector declares that there "isn't a cedar tree in this whole, d—n country," and, of course, there can be no "cedar rust" where there are no cedar trees. Technically, it is true that the so-called rough-bark cedar is not a cedar, but a cypress, but the "rust" on these trees bears no resemblance to the fungus on the pear. In fact, it is not a diseased condition but a very healthy one of the cedar, and appears to be a natural excrecence, necessary for the production of seed. But then, what is this fungus on the pear?

It is the identical same disease that to my certain knowledge has afflicted the service berry for the last 40 years. It also affects the quince, and as the service, or 'une berry, the quince and the pear are so nearly allied that they can be propagated, one upon the other, it is not surprising that this well-known and common disease should eventually attack the pear.

People who get knowledge from careful observation usually beat the "experts" to the proper conclusion. As to the remedy, there is nothing to be done now but destroy every affected specimen, as well as all the service berry bushes near orchards, and then go for the pear trees early next fall, when the spores are dormant on the buds. As soon as the buds open over so little in the spring, the mischief is done for the season. Bordeaux, properly applied in the fall, will likely check it.
