

GRANGE FAIR COMMITTEES

Heads of the Various Departments are Announced

The Cottage Grove Grange perfected arrangements for its annual fair at its last meeting by the appointment of heads for the various departments, and there was an open expression on the part of the membership, assuring G. W. McFarland, Master of the Grange, hearty co-operation and a united effort to make the fair this season the best ever held here. The dates set are for Sept. 18, 19 and 20, and the fair will be under the following named management: Superintendent, G. W. McFarland; assistant superintendent, T. W. DeLong; secretary vegetable department, M. M. Wheeler; secretary canned fruit department, Robt. Cooley; green fruit department, Rupert MaGee; grain department, Chas. W. Sears; livestock department, Chas. A. McFarland; fancy work department, Mrs. Robt. Cooley; committee on sports, Curtis Veatch, Rupert MaGee and C. E. Smith; manager poultry show, A. L. Wynne.

The space for exhibits in the pavilion will be enlarged and the stock pens will also be enlarged. The Lorane Horse Association has donated \$5 to be added to the cash prize for the best colts, and a fine exhibit is assured.

Ten dollars has already been set aside to start the purse for sports to be pulled off on Friday, Sept. 19, Cottage Grove day, and many prizes will be provided. The prizes in the big industrial school exhibit contest have already been announced.

One of the big attractions on the afternoon of the last day will be the prize baby show. Many entries were made last year and there promises to be even more competition for the prizes this season.

COTTAGE GROVE MAN DIES AT PUYALLUP

William Woolard, who last fall sold his Cottage Grove home on West Main street to Mrs. Rebecca Stidham, died at Puyallup, Wash., July 11, 1913, of tuberculosis.

Mr. Woolard was born at Armenia, Wis., Feb. 10, 1873, and moved to Hewitt, Minn., with his parents in 1882. There he was united in marriage to Miss Cora Turnmire. Twelve years ago he came to the West, hoping to recover his failing health. He has been confined to his bed since December at the new home in Puyallup.

The deceased leaves a widow, four sons, one daughter, four brothers and three sisters to mourn their loss.

The funeral was conducted from the Spur & Dunlap chapel, Elder Willoughby, of South Tacoma, officiating. Interment was in the Woodbine cemetery. L.

Frank H. Rosenberg Dead.

The report of the death of Frank H. Rosenberg, formerly of this city, at his new home in Aberdeen, Washington, July 24, 1913, came as a great surprise and shock to his many Cottage Grove friends. It seems his death was due to poisoning from eating canned goods which had become tainted. He was for a long time head bookkeeper for the old Pacific Timber Co. in this city, was later secretary of the Cottage Grove Commercial Club and president of the Cottage Grove Poultry Association, he being a great poultry fancier and breeder of fine Buff Cochins. Mr. Rosenberg was also a fraternity man, being an active member of the K. P., the Woodmen and other lodges in this city. He carried \$2,000 insurance in the Woodmen of the World order, but had transferred his membership from this lodge to the Eugene lodge a few years ago. He was about 48 years of age and leaves a wife and four daughters to mourn their sad loss. He was of a very genial and jovial disposition, was energetic and enterprising and was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him.

It has not been learned whether the remains were buried at Portland beside those of other relatives or at Aberdeen where the family resides. Cottage Grove friends, including H. K. Metcalf, the florist, sent beautiful floral offerings to the bereaved family along with messages of condolence and sympathy.

HEAVY RAINS OF BENEFIT TO MEDFORD

Medford, Or., July 26.—Three inches of moisture has fallen in the last two days, in a month when only one-fifth of an inch is the normal fall. Corn and hay have already been damaged and several bridges have been washed away. On the hillsides, where six inches has fallen, a large amount of soil has been washed away from the orchards. The benefit, however, is a thousand times greater than the loss. A larger crop of better fruit is expected. Fruit Prices Are High.

Medford, Ore., July 24.—With the blight eradicated and with an order from South Africa for 10,000 boxes of Jonathan apples at \$1.25 f. o. b. Medford, there is much satisfaction among growers of the Rogue River valley.

This order was received through the Northwestern Fruit Exchange, of Portland. The average price for Jonathans last year was 65 cents a box. The apples requested are not of the extra fancy grade.

According to Professor O'Gara, county pathologist, there will be at least 1000 cars of fruit shipped out of the valley this fall, the pear shipments beginning August 15. It is estimated that the crop will net the local growers nearly \$1,000,000. The \$30,000 cold storage plant is nearing completion.

Collar Bone Broken.

Ben Emerson who was filling his brother Ab's place on a railroad run while he was taking a brief vacation with his mother at Cottage Grove, while attempting to fasten the chains between two coaches in the railroad yards at Portland, was caught between the two vestibules and sustained a fractured collar bone and other bruises, the middle of last week. He was taken to a Portland hospital and upon receipt of a telegram, Ab and his mother went to Portland at once. Mrs. Emerson returned home Friday and reports her injured son on the road to recovery, but says he had a close call.

GAME SEASON IS AT HAND

Deer Can be Hunted Commencing on Next Friday

Hunting and fishing licenses are in great demand at the present time and County Clerk Russell and his force of deputies have been kept unusually busy during the past few days issuing them to sportsmen from all parts of the county who have been calling at the courthouse.

Many have also been sent out to various parts of the county by mail, many applications having been received from people residing in remote sections and unable to come to town after them.

The open season for deer begins on Friday of this week, August 1, and it will be lawful to hunt deer from then until October 31. The limit allowed by law for one season is three bucks for each person.

The open season for China pheasants starts on October 15 and continues for one month, closing at midnight on the 15th of November. Pheasants have been protected by law for several years and according to farmers residing in various parts of the county, the birds have multiplied rapidly and there are more pheasants than ever before.

According to the game laws relating to China pheasants only five birds may be killed in one day and roosters at that. However, a provision in the law allows one person the privilege of killing 35 birds in seven consecutive days.

Hunters who hold the old form of licenses may receive the required coupons or tags for attaching to deer killed by sending their licenses to county clerk, Stacey M. Russell, Eugene. No extra cost, except postage.

Some more fine gold bearing ore from the new strike in the Grizzly Mine in the Bohemia camp was brought out to Cottage Grove last week which shows that the ore becomes richer as work proceeds on the vein or ore shoot.
