Parcels Change Soon.

Washington, July 25.—Despite senatorial criticism of the proposed reduction in parcel post rates and the increase in the size of the packages, Postmaster-General Burleson today announced he would issue the final orders at once putting the changes in effect August 15. The announcement came after the wisdom of making the changes had been subjected to a searching review before the senate postoffice committee in the presence of the postmaster-general.

PUBLIC HIGHWAY COAST TO ROSEBURG

Marshfield, Or., July 22.—A trunkline hard surface road from Roseburg to Coos Bay via Myrtle Point. Also another trunk line from Curry county to Coquille via Bandon to connect with the main highway is projected.

That was the sense and sentiment of one of the biggest and best good roads meetings ever held in Coos county.

An election will be held, probably in October, to vote \$450,000 road bonds under the new state law which with \$250,000 that is expected to be the amount realized from a ten mill tax will give a grand total of \$700,000 for the construction of permanent roads next year in Coos.

Coast Line Is Started.

Grants Pass, Or., July 24.—Actual construction work has begun on the new California, Oregon & Eastern Railway with terminals for the present at Grants Pass in Josephine County, Oregon, and Crescent City in Del Norte County, California, on the coast. Early today 20 teams and men were ordered on the grade and dirt has been flying all day.

The Public Utilities Commission of the city council has contracted with the Interstate Construction Company for the completion of the road to Wilderville, 10 miles from Grants Pass, within 90 days and work is to be continuous and uninterrupted. The first unit of the road will be municipally owned, the construction company agreeing to take city bonds to the extent of \$200,000 in payment of construction.

One of the Market Troubles.

The fact that onions from Texas, potatoes from California and eggs and poultry from points outside of Oregon are being received in Portland and in carload lots while the farmers in the immediate vicinity of the city, as well as those tributary to the railroads leading to this market cannot find a market for their produce at any price, has led the Portland Realty Board to actively take up the question of establishing public markets where gardeners and farmers may dispose of their produce direct to the consumer with great benefit to both. It is stated that the fact that farmers cannot sell their own crops in Portland without a license, and the further fact that the commission men will not buy from him except at their own prices, is causing many farmers to allow fruits and vegetables to go to waste rather than dispose of them at a loss.
