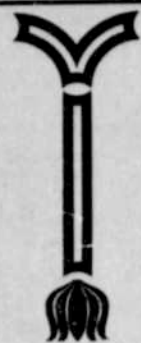

Estimated value of property, \$1,104,580. Improvements, \$35,839.
