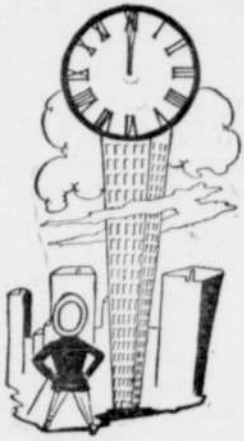
Violinist

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THE UNIVERSITY OF OREGON IS GREATLY HANDICAPPED

Basements, Attics and Crude Buildings
Utilized in Order to Take Care
of Increased Attendance

Extension Hall, shown in the accompanying picture, is a crude structure on the University of Oregon campus that the regents have been compelled to erect in order that the increasingly large number of young people of the state who are asking for better education may not be disappointed. The long continued attacks that have been made on the institution have cut off appropriation, making new buildings impossible. But, in spite of the warfare on the University, the boys and girls of the state have continued to come in larger numbers every year, with the result that the old equipment of buildings has been completely overflowed.

Various expedients to take care of the increasing student body have been resorted to. Existing class rooms have been made to do double service. Base-

The necessity of crowding four offices and two regular classes into Extension Hall is a specimen of conditions all over the University of Oregon campus, where less money has been spent during the last thirty years for buildings than Portland recently put into a single high school. Every recent appropriation for new buildings has been defeated. Yet, in spite of this opposition, the institution has continued to grow, because the people of Oregon have continued to send their children to it—or the young people have come themselves; for the records of the University show that more than sixty per cent of the students are earning their own way, either wholly or in part.

New buildings are absolutely necessary to meet the increasing demands for education, and the appropriations upon which the

ments and attics have been utilized and made to serve as new class rooms. Classes have been started at earlier hours in the morning and at later hours in evening.

But the attendance has grown so rapidly that these expedients have been insufficient, and more room was absolutely necessary. To meet the imperative need this rough board structure was erected. It is small, because there was almost no money available for its construction, but it will have to hold two classes and four offices, including the big Extension department of the University, the business of which is to arrange the conveyance of education to all the people through traveling teachers and correspondence courses.

people will vote on November 4th, are for the purpose of supplying these new buildings. The appropriations are extremely moderate, amounting to less than two cents on \$100.00.

The special election upon the two University appropriations, which total \$175,000.00, was called by a few men at an expense to the state of \$100,000.00. It will be held November 4th. One bill calls for \$100,000.00 for a new administration and class room building, the present one having been built in 1885 when the total attendance was less than two hundred; the other for \$75,000 for additions and repairs to four other buildings. The levy for this \$175,000.00 has already been made, and the money, if diverted from the University for which it was raised, will be spent for some other purpose, but no one knows what.

The appointment was made when the council refused to reappoint a former health officer, and the other old line physicians all refused the tendered appointment, when the osteopath was chosen instead.

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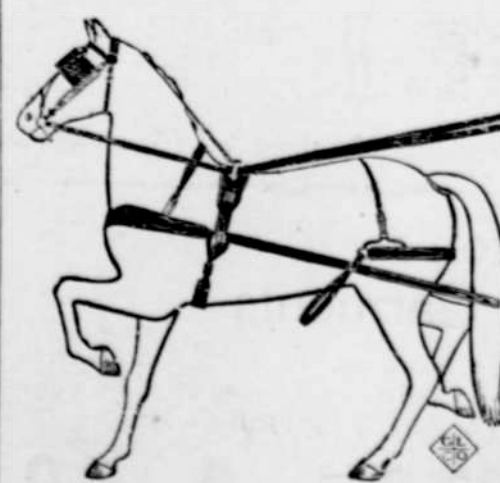
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
