MORE THOROUGH SCHOOL WORK

Eugene, Oct. 27.—More thorough work in the schools of Lane county than has ever been done before was the policy declared by County Superintendent Moore in his opening address before the Lane county teachers' institute today.

"We are failing to reach the results that we desire to reach," said Mr. Moore, "and I recommend that more attention be given by teachers to fundamentals."

Mr. Moore emphasized the series of spelling contests which are to be given by the schools of Lane county and which will culminate in a big contest to be held in Eugene on May 14 when individual cash prizes will be given and a pennant awarded to the school turning out the best spellers.

Another announcement made by Superintendent Moore was that the library books which are to be distributed to the schools of the county have arrived and are ready to be delivered.

As a committee on resolutions, to report on the last day of the institute, Wednesday, Superintendent Moore named Principal George W. Hug of the Eugene high school, Principal Dunton of Cottage Grove and Alice Kimball of Unity.

It is a somewhat curious fact that our law making is largely the work of amateurs.

The men we send to the state legislatures and to Washington are not the men who have had experience in the matter of taking care of great and important propositions.

They are for the most part men who have wormed themselves into office.

The business of government falls into the hands of the inexperienced and the unfit, says an exchange.

This thing of government by the selfish, the transient and the irresponsible is the most telling criticism to be made of our so-called democracy.

There should be a method devised by the government whereby the services of the highly trained men can be secured and utilized. And one of the crying needs of the trained man now is in the matter of getting the desirable food products of the west into the hands of the people in the cities of the east who need them most.

When peaches rotting in the orchards in the Yakima valley, millions of dollars worth of apples ungathered in Washington and Oregon—hundreds of carloads of onions, cabbages, spinach and berries in Texas, and thousands of people in Chicago, Boston, Philadelphia and New York going without fresh vegetables and without fresh fruit—this is the condition that challenges our economic skill.

The solution of the high cost of living lies in getting vegetables and fruit direct from farm to family with least possible expense.

The suffrage leaders, like Mrs. Abigail Scott Duniway, of Portland, the clubwomen of practically all Oregon towns, and mothers of children generally have all been urging upon their voting sisters to stand behind the University of Oregon bills as a means of demonstrating women's desire for that improvement in social and general living conditions that follows advancement of general education in a state.
