Jackrabbit Stops Fast Train.

How a jackrabbit stopped the crack Great Northern passenger train was related to a Spokane reporter by H. H. Dean, 319 South avenue. Hillyard, Wash., the engineer who stood at the throttle when the incident occurred. Here is the engineer's own version of the affair: "We were coming through Naylor, 130 miles west of Spokane, at 5:30 o'clock p. m., when the accident occurred," declares Mr. Dean. "We were bowling along about 50 miles an hour, pulling our full complement of coaches, when I saw a jackrabbit coming toward us full speed in the middle of the track. The animal evidently was confused by the brilliant glare from the electric headlight and made no effort to get out of the way. Just before we struck him he stopped and crouched down, and after the engine pilot passed over him the air brakes began to work and the train came to a sudden stop, the air register showing the brakes set on the emergency. The fireman and I got out to investigate, and found that the air-hose had been uncoupled between the engine and tender. There were blood stains and pieces of fur on the coupling, and it was evident that the body of the rabbit had been thrown against the hose with sufficient force to break the connections. While we were connecting the hose again the conductor came running up to discover the cause of the sudden stop, and when I told him we had run over a jackrabbit he thought I was 'kidding' him and got mad. He was from Missouri and we had to show him the stains on the coupling before he would be convinced. We were delayed but two or three minutes, and no one was injured by the sudden stop."

VILLA IS DICTATOR

All Spaniards Ordered Out of Chihuahua Never to Return.

Millions of Property Seized and Tribute Demanded—Leader Illiterate and Arbitrary.

El Paso, Tex.—Americans, Germans and Spaniards, who arrived from Chihuahua, Mex., report that Francisco Villa, the rebel leader, virtually had constituted himself dictator there and that he refused to heed the requests of representatives of foreign governments.

They asserted that the rebel leader had seized \$5,000,000 worth of property belonging to foreigners; had put to death about twenty Mexican civilians, including Sergio Sanchez, a lawyer and former state official, and had commanded the American, German and British consuls to obey rebel orders.

The happenings in Chihuahua since Villa occupied the city on its evacuation by Federal troops, as given by the refugees, who numbered 1000, were:

Villa seized a large department store valued at \$1,500,000 and owned by French, German, English and Spanish interests, but chiefly Spanish, and placed in command of the store General Chao, a rebel leader.

He also seized a brewery, a clothing factory and all the grocery and other stores owned by Spaniards, valued at \$3,500,000. He called a meeting and told them they must pay him sums of money, aggregating several million dollars, to support the revolution. He gave orders that the so-called Constitutional money should be accepted as currency.

Villa's expulsion of citizens of Spain, all of whom were progressive merchants, was on pain of death. At first he informed them they must be out of the country in five days, but later after an appeal to Harry Scobell, the British consul, he extended that time to ten days. The Spaniards were not allowed to take anything except personal effects and were told never to return.

Wallace, Idaho, Postoffice Robbed of \$17,100 Cash

Wallace, Idaho—Without leaving so much as a finger print as a clue, burglars early Sunday morning robbed the local postoffice of a little more than \$17,000 and apparently made good their escape. The robbery was committed sometime between 1:30 and 6 o'clock in the morning.

The registered mail on the Spokane train contained three \$5000 registered packages, consigned from the Old National Bank of Spokane, to the First National Bank of Mullan. The money was forwarded in order that the local institutions might be able to handle the pay checks of the Morning, Gold Hunter, Snow Storm and other mines of the Mullan district, which pay their employees on the 15th.

Suffragists Votes Not Purified By Lime

New York—Senator Helen King Robinson, of Colorado, told those who attended a tea of the Women's Political Union Monday that to deprive the women of the vote was like putting a cat in a bag. She said it was hard on the cat, but harder on the bag.

She also said that some time ago she heard a distinguished anti-suffragist argue that because there is only 5 per cent of lime in women and 7 per cent of it in man, nature evidently had intended that the right of suffrage was not for the female of the species. Some time later, said the senator, she learned that lions have 2 per cent of lime and that chickens have 10 per cent.

Feudist's Secret Kept.

Chicago—A feud which began in Sicily 20 years ago claimed a victim here Sunday. Mike Laporta was called to the door of his home by shouts that his brother was dying. As he stepped out he was attacked by three men and stabbed in 20 places.

Antonio Laporta, brother of the murdered man, said he knew who had killed Mike, but he refused to give their names to the police, saying: "It is my affair; I will find them."

Antonio admitted that his brother had been killed as a result of a feud. "He was not the first," he said. "He will not be the last."

War Veteran Mason Dies.

San Francisco—Colonel A. Andrews, the oldest commissioned officer of the civil war, as well as the oldest Mason in California, died here in his ninety-fourth year. He was a veteran of the Mexican war. He was born in London, but came to this country as a boy. He was in Louisville when the Mexican war broke out and was elected an officer of the Second regiment of Kentucky volunteers. He came out of the war a captain, and then came to California, where he started in the jewelry business in Sacramento.

London—A dispatch to the Times from Tokyo says that the Japanese government has been notified that Canada intends to prohibit all immigration to British Columbia for three months. The correspondent adds that as there will be no discrimination against Orientals, Japan cannot object.
