Dave and Bob Mosby and Jim Lane went to Cottage Grove Thursday.

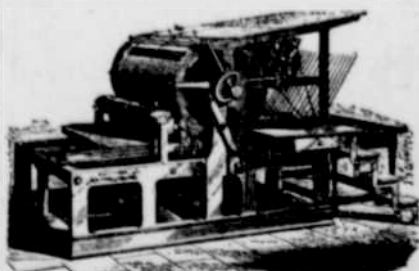
Amanda and Arthur Whitman have gone to McKenna, Wash., to spend the holidays.

AN ERRATIC VOLCANO.

Rose From the Sea, Formed an Island and Sank Again.

On June 16, 1810, the Sabrina, a British sloop of war, observed smoke arising from the sea near St. Michael, off the Azores, and made for it, believing that a naval engagement was in progress. Her crew found, however, that great tongues of flame were issuing along with the smoke and that they had cleared for action to fight a volcano.

Forty-eight hours later an island made its appearance, having risen from a depth of forty fathoms in that period, and in another day it was fifty-one feet above the surface, with a length of about three-quarters of a mile. By July 4 the Sabrina's people were able to land on this new shore, which was then 300 feet high, with a circumference of fully a mile, with a stream six yards wide running from the center to the sea.

They took formal possession of it for his Britannic majesty, hoisting the union jack on its most conspicuous point, but by degrees the island sank until about the middle of October it vanished below the surface, with the union jack still on it, like a battleship sinking with colors flying after a fatal engagement. —London Standard.

Staining Glass.

The art of coloring glass has been lost and re-found, guarded and stolen so many times during the history of civilization that it seems almost impossible to say anything new on glass staining. Yet a modern process for making the stained glass used in windows is a departure from anything known to the old timers. The glass first receives its design in mineral colors, and the whole is then fired in a heat so intense that the coloring matter and the glass are indissolubly fused. The most attractive feature of this method is that the surface acquires a peculiar pebbled character in the heat, so that when the glass is in place the lights are beautifully soft and mellow. —New York Herald.

CANNERY'S FIRST SEASON WORK VERY ENCOURAGING

A meeting of the board of directors of the Creswell Fruit and Vegetable Growers' Association was held at the cannery last Friday afternoon and a report of the year's business, just closed, was submitted. It was also decided what amounts the growers were to receive for the produce handled through the association this season. The following price will be paid the growers per ton for fruits brought in to be canned.

For strawberries, \$80; for raspberries, \$90; blackberries, \$40; for loganberries, \$70; pears, \$22; cherries \$40; for beans, \$30.

All of the canned goods have been sold and the returns have been received, and the growers are now receiving their checks in full for their produce. The output of fruit canned this season amounted to 5 carloads or 25,000 cans, all of which has been shipped with the exception of apples. Besides this the association has shipped 10 cars of apples packed in boxes and 11 cars of prunes, making a total of 25 carloads, for which the growers will receive approximately \$40,000. This fruit was all grown within the immediate vicinity of Creswell.

Some interesting figures were brought out at the meeting which will give some idea as to the productiveness of the soil in this section. Henry Achey harvested \$100 worth of beans from seven-eighths of an acre. This was on river bottom land. J. Weber produced 3000 pounds of loganberries from a patch containing one-third of an acre of ridge land. The first and last berries received at the cannery this year were brought in by M. N. Soper, who attributes the long picking season to intensified cultivation. This indicates that a small acreage will yield an enormous crop if properly cared for.

Eighty-six patrons of the cannery will share in the receipts from the sale of goods put on the market. During the season sixty people were employed at various times, meaning an expenditure of \$1200, which was met by the patrons paying the association 5

per cent of the price received for their fruit. All bills, including those for labor, fuel, lights and incidental expenses, were reported paid which goes to show that the season was a success financially.

The operation of the cannery the past season has been under the direct supervision of R. H. Parsons. It is a valuable asset to the community as well as a source of encouragement to the growers of small fruit in disposing of their produce. G. A. Emerson, manager of the cannery, has also given close attention to his work, putting forth his best efforts to make a success of the enterprise.

The directors were well pleased with the first year's business and predicted that next year's output will double that of the season just closed, in which case the present facilities for canning will be inadequate. Another canning machine will have to be added and more floor space added in order to handle such a crop. This seems more than likely as the directors are urging growers and others interested to set out more acreage to berries for next year. —Chronicle.
