ARMY OF UNEMPLOYED AT EUGENE AND GROVE

The two armies of unemployed which is marching from Portland south to California arrived in Eugene Monday and were housed and fed at the expense of the local unions of that city. No harsh treatment of the army was permitted by the officers. Rimer's "army" was first taken to the armory which the other army had just vacated. Their blanket rolls were left there and the column, 48 strong, was marched to the coffee club, where a tempting dinner awaited. Soon afterward this crowd, too was sent on its way south.

RIMERS ON HONEYMOON

Mrs. Dorothy Rimer, wife of E. W. Rimer, the leader of the main "army" of the unemployed, arrived in Eugene Sunday noon and went to the Coffee club where she met the committee from the churches who are assisting in the entertainment for the "army" while in that city. The Rimers have been married but a short time and this jaunt down the valley is their honeymoon trip, so she says. Her home is in Indianapolis, Indiana, and she and her husband were forced to look for work before their honeymoon trip was ended and she agreed that this one was rather unique. She dresses neatly and wears on the lapel of her coat a Masonic lodge pin. When asked where she got it she said that it was her father's but that she has met a lot of people on her trip that seemed to disregard all fraternal affiliations as at Shedd the officers were determined that she should sleep in the same room with the 100 men who made up the "army" at that place.

Mrs. Rimer said their reception in Eugene had been the most humane along the line from Portland and she was particularly bitter in her denunciation of the people of Albany. The mayor, she said would not permit them to eat the meal that an Albany restaurant keeper had prepared for them nor were they furnished any more solid sustenance than a cup of coffee and a sandwich, except the meal which was furnished them by the Albany Elks' lodge.

ARMY BREAKING UP.

The straggling remnant of the army of unemployed reached Cottage Grove this Tuesday evening. It comprised but 19 men, others having turned back after leaving Eugene, and some remaining at Creswell and Saginaw. The 19 men were lodged in the city hall for the night by Marshal Pitcher and this (Wednesday) morning were given a good breakfast consisting of hot coffee, sandwiches and buns, after which they were escorted to the city limits by the marshal and headed south. Mr. and Mrs. Rimer, the leaders, did not put in an appearance at this place, but evidently returned north from Eugene.
