M'MURPHY FOR COUNTY JUDGE

SEEKS REPUBLICAN NOMINATION.

Economical Administration of County's Affairs and Improvement of Public Highways are Promised.



R. McMurphy, councilman from the second ward in Eugene, has announced his intentions to become a candidate on the republican ticket for the position of Lane county judge. Mr. McMurphy has lived in Eugene many years and is widely known throughout the county.

He has held positions as member of the Eugene school board, first vice president and second president of the Eugene Commercial club and as chairman of the street committee of the Eugene city council has done much to obtain good highways within the city. He has made himself famous in his home town on account of the cleanly condition of the streets and alleys, the State Dairy and Food Commissioner, after an inspection of the city a short time ago remarking that the streets and alleys in Eugene were cleaner than those of any other town in the state.

In speaking of his candidacy while in Cottage Grove Wednesday, Mr. McMurphy said:

"If elected to the office I shall use my utmost endeavor to promote as economical administration of the county's affairs as is consistent with efficiency. I am familiar with road and other conditions all over the county from Florence to Foley and Belknap, from the Northern boundary of the county to London and the Bohemia mining district where I am considerably interested.
