Brigadier General Evans Heads Uncle Sam's Department of East

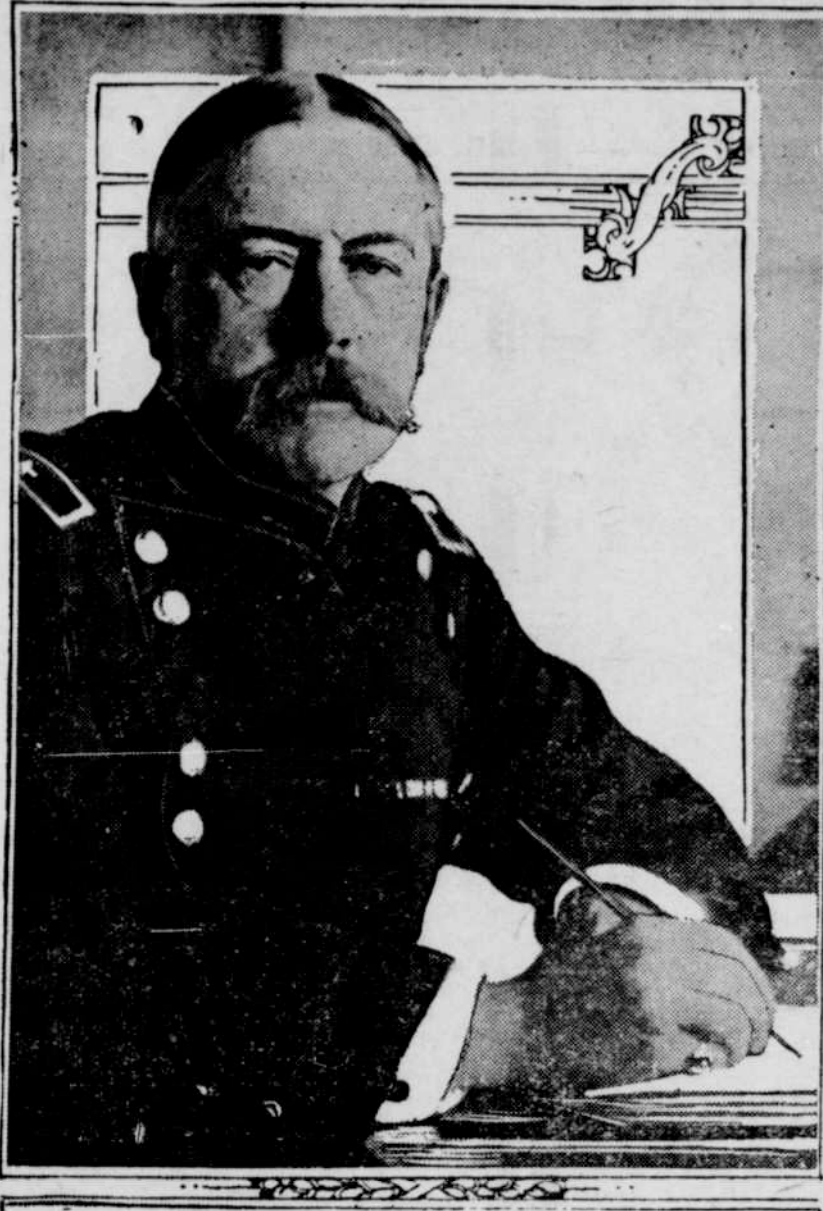

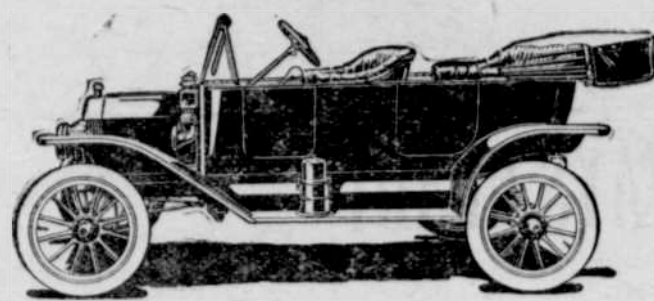
To William Sloan and J. C. Burdge, Defendants above named.
