SUSTAINS BROKEN ARM.

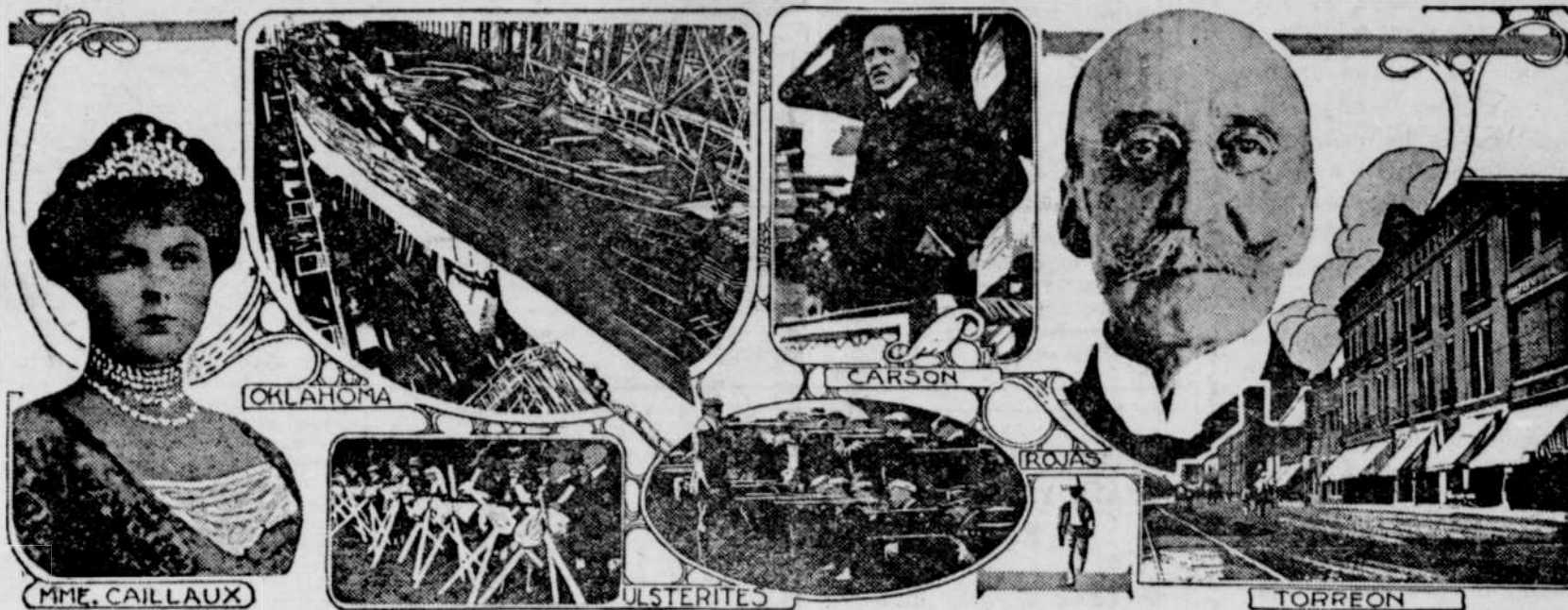

Intense excitement prevailed throughout Great Britain and Ireland over the home rule situation. Sir Edward Carson, leader of Unionists, returned to Belfast after Ulster's rejection of Premier Asquith's compromise. Officers of a British regiment in Ireland sent to strengthen Ulster garrisons resigned rather than be placed in the position of fighting Unionists and were later reinstated. Mme. Caillaux, wife of France's minister of finance, killed Calmette, editor of Figaro. Torreón was attacked by Mexican rebels. Rojas, Mexican minister of foreign affairs, was reported to be possible successor of Huerta. The battleship Oklahoma was launched at Camden, N. J.

Second Lodge Organized In
Cottage Grove

MEMBERSHIP IS NOW 176

Cottage Grove Lodge No. 68, I. O. O. F.
Has History Full of Activity and Benevolent Deeds.

A dispensation was granted on July 19, 1880, to institute a lodge of Independent Order of Odd Fellows in Cottage Grove, of which S. P. Garoutte, Aaron Lurch, M. N. Foley, H. Thompson and Dr. H. Wright were charter members, in addition to the corps of officials.

On August 21, 1880, a charter was granted by Phil Metschan, Grand Master, and countersigned by J. M. Basin, Grand Secretary, and Cottage Grove lodge, No. 68, I. O. O. F. was organized with the following officers: M. N. Foley, N. G.; H. Thompson, V. G.; Aaron Lurch, secretary; A. L. Wynne, treasurer; M. J. Fenwick, conductress; P. Ayers, warden; C. H. Wallace, chaplain; H. Wright, R. S. N. G.; A. H. Spare, L. S. N. G.; Geo. McGowan, R. S. V. G.; S. Veatch, L. S. V. G.; W. Cathcart, R. S. S.; John Wallace, L. S. S.

In the early 80's the Odd Fellows, in conjunction with the Masons, built the upper story of what is now known as the old Masonic hall, which then stood near where Whit Gowdy now lives. They occupied this hall a few years, then sold their interest to the Masons for \$300 and moved into the old school house, standing in the street where Tom Allen lives; later they moved into what was known as the Jeff Markley hall located on North River street. A few years later the lodge moved across the river into a hall built by H. Thompson, located where the First National bank now stands, and a few years afterwards purchased the Markley building for \$2000 and moved back to it where they stayed until July, 1910, when this property was sold to Oscar Woodson and the Odd Fellows purchased the B. K. Lawson property on Main street near the river for \$5000 and have expended about \$800 in improving the building. They now have a hall that is above the average throughout the state.

Through these years of struggling and moving, No. 68 maintained her love and friendship, visiting the sick, relieving the distressed, and now have bright prospects for a great future.

The present membership is 176 with 34 Past Grands. The present officers are J. B. Simeral, N. G.; Wm. Southward, V. G.; Harry Short, secretary; H. J. Shinn, treasurer; Geo. M. Hall, warden; S. C. Newcomb, conductor; Geo. Baird, chaplain; S. O. Hamblin, R. S. N. G.; Geo. Wilson, L. S. N. G.; Chas. McKibben, R. S. V. G.; W. N. Hubbell, L. S. V. G.; L. E. Whitbeck, I. S. G.; Frank Woodruff, O. S. G.; K. K. Mills, R. S. S.; D. W. Custer, L. S. S.; J. W. Eddy, D. D. G. M.

The records show for the last 12 years as follows: 153 initiated; 21 reinstated; 23 admitted by card; 14 withdrawn; 13 deceased; 171 relieved. Amount of benefits paid, \$6060.12.
