PLATFORM

I am in favor of repealing the present tax law, and the enactment as a law providing for 2 per cent rebate on taxes paid in full when due, or in two semi-annual installments without rebate, interest or penalty levied upon an equitable assessment.

I am opposed to legislation creating unnecessary offices with high salaries, to perform nominal or theoretical service, and am in favor of repealing all such laws now in force.

I am opposed to the increase of salaries of public officers where the present incumbents are willing to hold on or where good men are willing to take the offices at the present salaries.
