If some of those traveling experts known as baseball scouts had seen Pitcher Medley perform at Midway park last Sunday, when he defeated Eugene in a brilliant game, Manager Bartels would undoubtedly now be hunting for another first class slab artist. And if Medley repeats another such performance he will be in faster company before the season gets half over.

He has every requisite that goes to make up a star twirler. With a good, cool head, worlds of speed, and an assortment of shoots and curves that would fill a bat sack, he should easily rank among the best finds of the season. An underhand shoot that he delivers with terrific speed is his most effective ball, and this combined with change of pace on curved balls renders the batter almost helpless.

McKevitt also pitched a good game, and with better support would have held the locals down. Poor base running also helped to defeat him.

Smith lead for Cottage Grove, and after fouling off a fast one, drove a pretty single over short, but was forced out at second on an attempted sacrifice. Eugene scored their only run in the last half of the first with a triple and single. Only one hit was registered off Medley after that, it being a single by McKevitt.

In the second inning the locals put the game on ice by scoring three runs. One single, a double, sacrifice and an error producing the result, which ended the scoring, and the large crowd then settled down to witness as pretty a pitching duel as was ever seen on Midway field.

One of the pleasant features of the contest was the absence of rough conduct and abusive language by either the players or crowd, the elimination of which will make Sunday baseball very popular all around the circuit, and no doubt increase the attendance very materially.

The local team was treated royally by the Eugene management and members of the Atlas club, at which place the visiting team were guests.

CITY COUNCIL HOLDS ADJOURNED MEETING

Two Ordinances for Street Improvements Pass Second Reading—Matter of Improving Ninth Street Discussed.

An adjourned meeting of the city council was held in the council chambers Monday evening, at which time street improvements were generally discussed and two ordinances passed second reading under suspension of the rules.

The meeting was called to order with Councilman Kime in the chair, Mayor Chambers being unable to be present account of absence from the city on important business matters. Councilman Hayes was also necessarily absent for business reasons. The members and officers present were Councilmen Silsby, Walker, Kime, Knowles and Wheeler; City Recorder Young, City Engineer Nichols, Assistant Water Commissioner Warner and City Marshal Pitcher.

The first matter of business taken up was the reading of ordinance No. 401, which provided for the improvement and hard surfacing of Eighth street one block north and one south from Main. By petition of property owners present the ordinance was amended to read from the north line of Washington avenue to the south line of Gibbs avenue. Later, after discussion on the part of property owners and the council, it was decided to draft a new ordinance providing for the improvement and hard surfacing of the entire street.

Ordinance No. 402, calling for the hard surface pavement of Pacific Highway from the south line of Main street to the south line of the Mellis place, passed the second reading and was laid over until the next meeting for final action.

Ordinance No. 403, providing for laying a 16-foot macadam road on Pacific Highway from the south line of the Mellis place south to the city limits passed the second reading and was laid over until the next meeting for final action.

Water commissioner was instructed to detach the Landess reservoir from the main water system, so as to be in readiness to turn it over to Mr. Landess at the expiration of the lease on the 24th inst.

The matter of drainage of the overflow water on the east side was thoroughly discussed, it being the sentiment of the council not to proceed in the matter unless the property owners directly interested were willing to put up their share of the cost. However, the council ordered an ordinance drawn for the improvement of North Douglas street from Shasta Place to Villard avenue.

Messrs. J. F. Spray and B. S. Swengel, acting as a committee from the commercial club, appeared before the council and asked for information as to when the further improvement of Ninth street would be continued. They stated that the people living on that thoroughfare were becoming restless over what they con-

sidered unnecessary delay, and were very anxious to have the improvement work proceed as soon as possible. The matter was discussed pro and con, Mr. Wheeler stating that he was much interested and about as anxious as anyone to have the work go ahead and completed, and that such would be done as soon as practicable. Mr. Knowles stated that the contractors were under bond of a surety company to complete the work and had signified their willingness and intention to the council to proceed with the improvements just as soon as the weather would permit and the street was in a dry enough condition to work. Last fall the council, realizing that good work could not be done during stormy weather, on account of mud and mire, had extended the time for completing the contract of improving Ninth street, and so far this spring the street has not been in a condition long enough at any one time to be properly worked to completion, and it is said that at present in places it would mire an empty wagon, much less a steam roller.

There being no further business the council adjourned to accept an invitation from Messrs. Spray and Swengel to partake of coffee and doughnuts.
