ORDER EASTERN STAR WAS THIRD SOCIETY

Has Been Big Factor in the Fraternal Life of City—Now Has Membership of One Hundred Forty-Five.

The Order of Eastern Star was organized in Cottage Grove in July, 1880, just a few days after the installation of the I. O. O. F. and was named and numbered Cottage Grove Chapter No. 4, O. E. S.

The organization has followed the Masonic Lodge through its changes and moves, and is now quartered in the handsome Masonic Hall, just west of the Main street bridge.

There have been many changes in the membership of the Chapter through the coming and going of its members, and it now has on its roster the names of 145 members in good standing.

News Snapshots Of the Week

Governor Glynn of New York refused to grant a stay of execution in the case of the four gun men sentenced to die in Sing Sing April 13 for the murder of Herman Rosenthal, the New York gambler. They are shown grouped around the death chair as follows: Upper left, Whitey Lewis; upper right, Dago Frank; lower left, Gyp the Blood; lower right, Lefty Louie. About seventy senters were frozen to death when cut off by a blizzard from their ship, the Newfoundland. Major Fierro, an aid of General Villa, was held responsible by Carranza for the murder of W. S. Benton the English rancher. A serious wreck occurred on the Wabash at Attica, Ind. Ulster volunteers in Ireland continued their preparations for home rule conflict. Ex Governor Eben S. Draper of Massachusetts was stricken with paralysis and died. United States Senator Burton of Ohio announced he would not run again for the senate after many years' service.
