men have robbed the public by allowing produce to rot rather than put it on the market below a fictitiously fixed price. As the influence of a co-operative selling system extends its influence, the commission man's territory will become less and less, until in a few short years this class of robbers will have entirely disappeared.

The only way for small producers to find a profitable market is by and through co-operative organizations, of which the new cannery association at this place is, in a small way, a fair sample, and members of this association are already reaping the benefits, while the association can hardly be said to be in operation. Every producer in the community should be a member.
