**Our Query and Reply Department**  
Kindly answer what is fuller's earth, where it is obtained, what it is used for and what is its market value?  
It is a mixture in certain proportions of a peculiar kind of clay with sand and lime. The clay, its principal ingredient, is found at different places in England and perhaps in this country. It formerly was much used for cleansing oil from wool and woolen fabrics, but it has been superseded by soap and has no quotable value.

What is the exact meaning of the word honeymoon?  
It is a compound word of honey, sweet, and moon, a month, meaning the first sweet month after marriage, but sometimes lasting longer. Dr. Johnson defined it in his dictionary, "The first month after marriage, when there is nothing but tenderness and pleasure." A much earlier lexicographer defined it as "a term proverbially applied to such as be new married, which will not fall out at the first, but the one loveth the other at the beginning exceedingly, the likelihood of their exceeding love appearing to assuage, the which time common people call the honeymoon." There is a cynical note in this, as if a honeymoon were limited to a month's time. And another lexicographer of the seventeenth century says the word is "applied to those married persons that love well at first and decline in affection afterward. It is honey now, but it will change as the moon." Modern lexicographers have prolonged the period, and one writer mentions a honeymoon that lasted a whole year.

Can photographs be sent by cable across the Atlantic?  
Berlin reports say that the selenium method of Professor Alfred Korn of Munich for sending photographs by telegraph has been so perfected that it may be possible within a year to transmit pictures across the Atlantic. Some time ago it was announced that Professor Korn had made such progress with his invention that excellent likenesses had been sent from Munich to Nuremberg, a distance of about 100 miles. He asserted at the time that he expected to be able to transmit to New York a picture which would be good enough for newspaper use in thirty minutes.

Kindly give a rule for the correct use of will and shall.  
The proper use of the two words depends on whether they are used in the first, second or third person. To express mere future action shall is used with the first person singular or plural and will with the second and third persons; as I shall go tomorrow, or we shall go; you will go and he or they will go. To use will in the first person, as I will go, or shall in the second or third persons, as you shall go, he shall go or they shall go would imply authority, determination or compulsion. This general rule has many modifications to express different shades of meaning, but it applies broadly. An old example of the wrong use of the words was that of a drowning man who cried, "I will drown, no person shall help me." If he had said, "I shall drown, no person will help me," he would at least have perished grammatically correct.

Can you tell the origin or significance of the term "blue stocking" as one applied to literary women?  
It was a derisive epithet for which women were in no way responsible. In or about 1750 Mrs. Elizabeth Montagu, a woman of means and high social standing in London made an effort to introduce into society a more intellectual tone by holding assemblies at which literary conversation and discussion were to take the place of cards and gossip. Although her assemblies were primarily of women, men were not excluded, and one who embraced the opportunity to improve his mind by contact with bright women was Benjamin Stillingfleet, a well known naturalist and linguist of the period, who was the author of a poem on "Earthquakes" and "An Essay on Conversation." The Montagu assemblies were not dress affairs, and because Mr. Stillingfleet invariably appeared in blue worsted stockings instead of the conventional black silk of the period the wits of the day called Mrs. Montagu's lady friends blue stockings, and from that the term was applied to literary women generally. Mrs. Montagu built one of the finest residence houses in London, and entertained the London chimney sweeps every May day as long as she lived. She died in 1800.

In Nevada and Utah the prisoners are given the preference, either hanging or shooting.
