### CALL FOR BIDS

For Lighting the Streets of Cottage Grove

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received by the Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove on the 3rd day of August, 1914, at the hour of 8:00 o'clock p. m. of said day for lighting the streets of the City for a term of either three or five years, to begin on the last day of January, 1915. Bids will be received for the following lights:

A minimum of 30 600-candle-power Series arc lights or their equivalent in lighting power in cluster lights or other forms of light to be approved by the Council, also for a minimum of 60 incandescent lights of 48 candle power or their equivalent, with a price on 80-candle power incandescent lights to be substituted in place of one or more 48-candle power lights. All of said lights to burn from sunset to sunrise and be installed and maintained at the expense of the contractor.

No bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check or cashiers check on a reliable bank in the sum of \$1000, payable to the City of Cottage Grove, to be forfeited to said City unless said bidder enters into a contract satisfactory to the City, if same is awarded, and furnishes a good and sufficient bond to furnish said lights by January 1st, 1915.

The Common Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids.
