

GOVERNOR WEST SEES TRADE FOR OREGON

"The war in Europe should have the immediate effect of bringing prosperous times to Oregon by increasing the demand for Oregon products," declared Governor West upon his arrival in Portland from his Chautauqua lecture tour in the East.

The Governor discerned no cause for alarm in this state over the disastrous European war and was optimistic over the future.

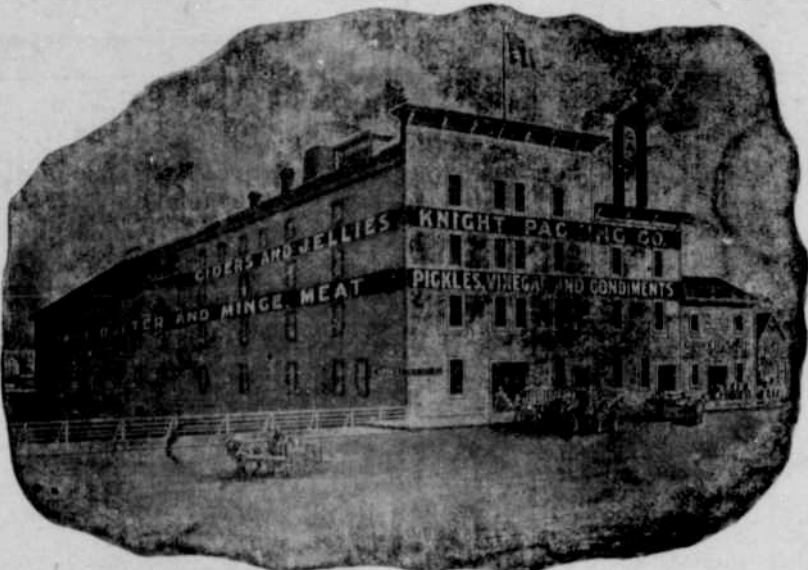
Oregon may learn a valuable lesson in conservation from the middle west and east, which, drained of their resources by capital in other states and with natural means already developed to their utmost, are going backward rather than forward, said the Governor.

"We in the West are prone to think that everything good must originate east of here and must come to us from beyond the Rockies," he asserted. "My eyes were opened during my recent trip and I have come back with new convictions and with new admiration for the Far West. With prodigal recklessness, the East has thrown away its great natural resources and now it is beginning to pay the penalty.

"Great oil fields have been tapped in the Middle Western states worth millions. But the oil has been appropriated and the profits taken by magnates further east. Is this to the credit of the middle west? Great mines have brought fortunes to their owners, but the owners are seldom residents of the states where they have their property. I witnessed one of the strikes. Rather than fight the magnates had closed down the mines, leaving thousands out of work and devastating the small city which was depending on the mines for support. Is this prosperity?"

"I visited many state institutions with the hope of getting new ideas for propagation here. But throughout Ohio, Illinois and other states I visited I found, in the main, that these institutions were inferior to ours. Many of them were situated in the heart of a city, with no grounds, found so essential here. In the majority of cases superintendents were not chosen as they are here—politics interfered to a great degree with good management.

"But the great lesson for the West to learn—and I believe she is learning it—is conservation of resources, for the future depends upon what the present leaves. Let us hope it is an intelligent present in the West."

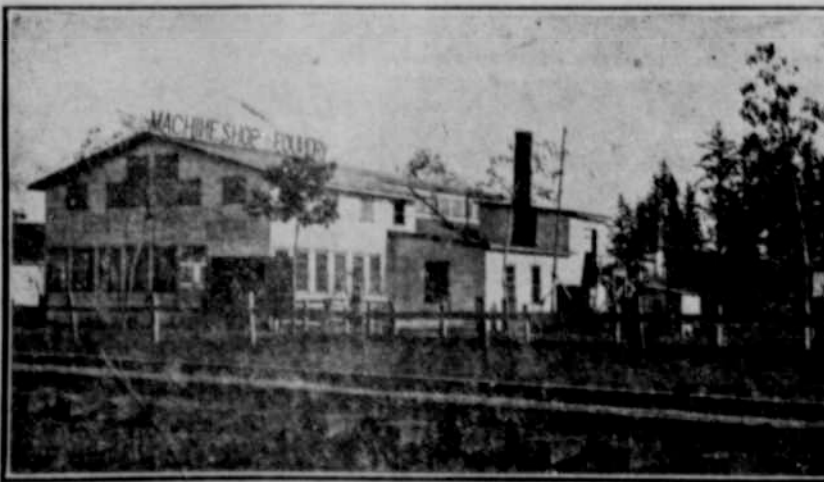

A Word to Montgomery Ward Patriots (From the North Bend Harbor)

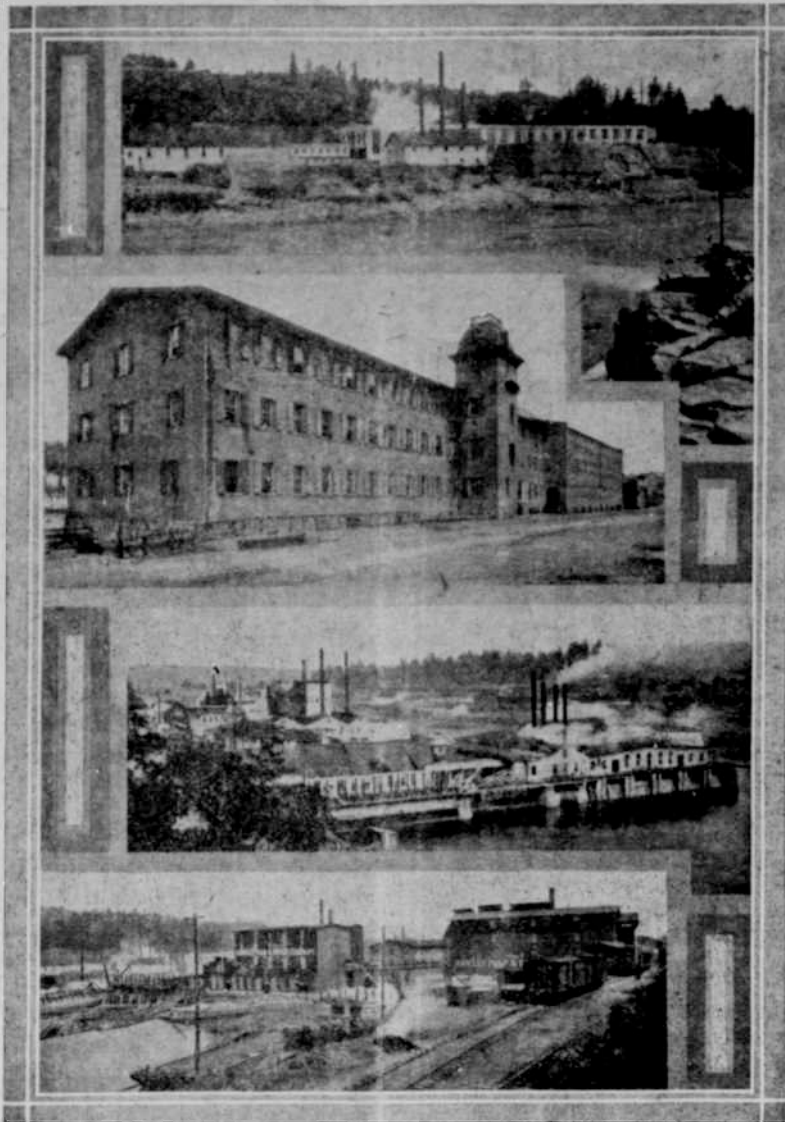

Just suppose that a manufacturer employed a traveling salesman, and that he was a hustler. That he got a good deal of business for his house and was as good as the best. And this salesman called on a lot of houses in the territory he covered and they did not give him an order. Would that manufacturer order his salesman to stop visiting those houses or even discharge him for not getting business?

He would know, and so would the traveler, that to stop going might mean that just when he stopped the houses that failed to give him business in the past might be just ready to buy. And the traveler keeps on going until he gets some part of the business.

But this same manufacturer will try an advertisement in a trade paper of known pulling power. He runs it once or twice and results are not what he expected. Just as people are beginning to take notice of the ads and get interested, the manufacturer pulls off his best salesman—advertising—because he did not get orders the first or second trip.

Might as well hire a high class traveler who has made good for other houses, give him a week or two weeks' trial, and fire him. One way is as logical as the other. And both are costly, unsatisfactory, and work harm not only to the trade press, but to the salesman. Think this over, Mr. Spasmodic Advertiser. — Implement Trade Journal.

When was forestry first taught in any of the schools in the United States?

The first professional school of forestry was established at Cornell university in 1898. Since that time instruction in forestry has been introduced in a large number of institutions. Today there are twenty-two institutions which give courses leading to a degree in forestry and about forty others which include forestry in their curricula. There are more than 1,000 young men studying in the forest schools.

What is the United States revenue cutter service? Is it the same as the revenue marine service?

It is a military arm of the government attached to and under the direction of the treasury department. The service was organized in 1790 and constituted the original naval force of the country. There was at that time no navy department, and the service was placed under the treasury department, where it has remained ever since. It is charged with the enforcement of the navigation and customs laws of the United States, the assistance of vessels in distress, the protection of the sealing industry in Alaska, the enforcement of the quarantine laws, the destruction of derelicts and other floating dangers to navigation and numerous other duties appropriate to its class of vessels. Each winter, by direction of the president, a number of the cutters patrol the coast for the special purpose of assisting vessels in distress. The service co-operates with the navy when directed by the president and has so co-operated in every war in which the United States has been engaged. It is sometimes called the revenue marine service, but revenue cutter service is the proper name. There are forty-three cutters in the service, and they carry from one to five or six guns each.

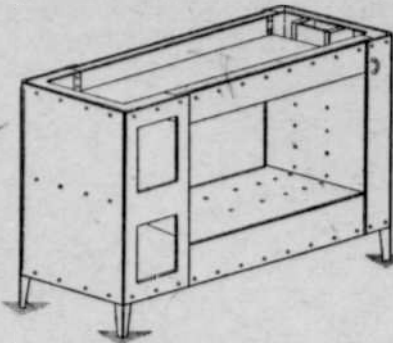
What are the lengths of Mexico's eastern and western coasts?
