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BREWERS USED NAMES WITHOUT SANCTION

Portland Liquor Dealers Send Out Wet Advertising with Names Thereon Forged.

Portland, Oct. 25.—The Committee of One Hundred makes the following report regarding the liquor men's answer to the dry challenge:

The Union Meat Company repudiates the use of its name by liquor men as unauthorized.

R. W. Montague declares he never signed the statement below which his name appears.

The Pacific Paper Company denounce the use of their name as unauthorized.

Ira F. Powers says he never signed any such statement as that offered by the Oregon Brewers' Association as bearing his signature.

W. D. Wheelwright says he has signed nothing at all in the past two months, while the Committee of one Hundred's challenge was made nine days ago.

Dr. A. C. Panton says no one had any authority to use his name as a supporter of the brewers, and certainly not as taking up the committee of One Hundred's challenge.

W. B. Glafke says he does not remember ever signing any such statement of the kind.

M. L. McGraw, president of the East Side Fuel Company, says he never signed his name.

H. T. Clark, of the Portland Iron Works, says he never allowed his name to be used in connection with the Committee of One Hundred challenge.

Donald McKay says he signed no statement of any kind whatever.

Less than half a dozen men were willing to admit that they subscribed to the unique "declaration of principle" in the liquor dealers' published advertisement, which all—with nearly 62,000 others—were asserted to have signed.

As soon as the Committee of One Hundred began to check up the list, it met with indignant protests that names had been used by the liquor interests without authority.

On the opening of Columbia Court from its present south terminus to connect with East Main Street.

Notice is hereby given to whom it may concern, that O. L. Nichols, City Engineer for Cottage Grove, Oregon, has filed with the City Recorder his report of the opening of Columbia Court from its present south terminus to connect with East Main street, together with a plat of said street and the land proposed to be appropriated for the opening of said street described as follows:

Beginning at a point south 89 degrees and 36 minutes east 174.1 feet and 25 feet north from the southwest corner of D. L. C. No. 55, run thence north 39 degrees and 45 minutes east along the east line of the right-of-way of the O. P. & E. R. R. and the west line of the land of H. D. Larsen 136 feet to the north line of the Larsen land, and the south line of the land of Mrs. C. A. Perkins and 165 feet to a point, thence north 28 degrees and 55 minutes east 51 feet to the west line of said Perkins land and the east line of the O. P. and E. right-of-way, and 224 feet to the north line of Shasta Place, thence south 61 degrees and 13 minutes east 50 feet to the east line of Columbia Court, thence south 28 degrees and 55 minutes west 22 1-2 feet to the east line of the O. P. and E. right-of-way and the west line of the Perkins land and 222.5 feet to the south line of Perkins land and the north line of Larsen's land and 227.5 feet to a point thence south 39 degrees 42 west, 130 feet to the north line of East Main Street, thence north 89 degrees and 36 minutes west 45 feet to the place of beginning.
