GERMAN CRUISER SUNK BY BRITISH

**Two Other Cruisers Are Badly
Damaged and Attack on
Coast Frustrated.**

London.—An attempt by a German cruiser squadron to repeat the attack recently made on Scarborough, the Hartlepool and other British coast towns was frustrated by the British patrolling squadron.

In a running fight the German armored cruiser Bluecher was sunk and two German battle cruisers were seriously damaged.

The official report issued by the press bureau gives the following account of the engagement:

"Early this morning a British patrolling squadron of battle cruisers and light cruisers under Vice-Admiral Sir David Beatty, with a destroyer flotilla under Commodore Tyrwhitt, sighted four German battle cruisers and several light cruisers and several destroyers steering westward and apparently making for the English coast.

"The enemy at once made for home at high speed. They were at once pursued and about 9:30 A. M. action was joined between the battle cruisers Lion, Tiger, Princess Royal, New Zealand and Indomitable on the one hand, and the Derflinger, Seydlitz, Moltke and Bluecher on the other. A well-contested running fight ensued. Shortly after 1 o'clock the Bluecher, which had previously fallen out of line, capsize and sank.

"Admiral Beatty reports that two other battle cruisers were seriously damaged."

Germans Massing Troops at La Bassee
London.—Dispatches from the battle line in France and Flanders indicate that the Germans are massing troops in the neighborhood of La Bassee, evidently in preparation for a new struggle between Ypres and Courtrai and the allies are further strengthening their forces all along the lines in northern France and in Flanders. For the past 24 hours it has been give and take, each side admitting minor reverses offset by minor successes.

BOMBS DROPPED BY RIVAL AIRMEN

London.—While German airmen were dropping bombs on Dunkirk, one of which damaged the American consulate, two British aviators paid a visit to Ghent and Zebrugge and succeeded, at Zebrugge, in damaging a submarine and killing or wounding the crews of the guns mounted on the mole to prevent attack from the sea on that new German base.

The British official report says that apart from the breaking of the windows and the smashing of the furniture of the American consulate, "no particular damage was done" at Dunkirk. It makes no reference whatever to a Paris report that six persons were killed and others wounded, and it is therefore not known whether this report covers completely the attack of the German airmen, who, according to unofficial dispatches, dropped as many as 80 bombs on the French port.

Campaign in East Centers in Hungary

London.—A complete change in the eastern campaign, such as would mark a new period of the war, is expected by officers of the Russian general staff. They say that the German and Austrian military chiefs have abandoned aggressive movements against Warsaw, and are concentrating troops in Hungary to repel the Russian invaders in Bukovina, eastern Galicia and northern Hungary.

MT. LASSEN ERUPTS AGAIN

**Tremors Felt 25 Miles Away and
Ashes Carried 14 Miles.**

Redding, Cal. — A magnificently spectacular demonstration was given by Lassen Peak, which broke forth in what is perhaps the most violent eruption of the series that began last May. Subterranean rumblings and tremors of the earth were heard and felt at Volta, 25 miles from the peak. Falling ashes covered the snow fields at Macomber Flat, 14 miles away. The plumed column of steam from the crater was visible at great distances.

The eruption shows no signs of abatement. Rumblings were heard for an hour preceding the outbreak. The eruption appears to come from a new crater on the eastern slope. The main crater and the one at North Peak are quiet. The clouds of black smoke rise to a height of several thousand feet.

Business Revival Shown in Traffic.
Chicago.—Substantial gains in traffic on western railroads this month bear out assertions of general business improvement throughout the country.

NEW STATE IS PLANNED

**Bill to Be Offered at Olympia May Cut
Off 20 Counties.**

Olympia, Wash.—Senator Hutchinson, of Spokane, this week will introduce in the Washington legislature a joint memorial, asking congress to create the new state of Lincoln from the 20 counties of eastern Washington.

The 19 counties of western Washington in the aggregate, went "wet," by nearly 4000 votes, while eastern Washington went "dry" by about 22,000. Ever since the election there has been some talk by Seattle liquor men of the possibility of divorcing eastern Washington so as to provide a "wet" state of the coast counties and the Hutchinson measure will provide them a chance to rally their strength in this direction if they wish to do so.

Thaw Is in New York Tombs Again.

New York.—Harry K. Thaw again is in the Tombs, brought here from Boston, his only stop over on the way from New Hampshire. He was locked up in the prison which he left almost seven years ago, when he was committed to the state asylum for the criminally insane at Matteawan, following his acquittal of the murder of Stanford White on the ground of insanity.

Art Preservation Is Aim.

Rome.—A group of well-known Italians has addressed a letter to Secretary of State Bryan conveying an appeal that the United States take some action to the end that the monuments of art in the belligerent countries be preserved from ruin.

JOHNSON UPHOLDS ALIEN LAND ACT

Sacramento. — Governor Johnson placed himself squarely on record as opposed to any amendment to the alien-land act, passed by the California legislature in 1913. He indicated that if the Shartel bill, introduced in the assembly, eliminating the three-year leasing clause, passed the legislature, it would meet with the executive veto.

The elimination of the three-year leasing clause is sought by labor organizations generally throughout the state. If adopted it would have the effect of prohibiting Japanese and other alien farmers who are ineligible to citizenship from leasing land which they are prohibited from purchasing.

Governor Johnson stated that no valid reason exists why the alien land bill, passed with so much difficulty two years ago, should now again be presented to the legislature for amendment, and there are many reasons why it should not. "It is my hope, and to this end so far as consistently I can, I shall lend my aid, that the existing law be not disturbed."
