TASK FOR A MODERN MOSES

The cost of living mounts higher and higher, yet in Oregon there are unlimited resources for the production of the things that sustain life which lie in inexcusable idleness.

Vast areas of land, much of it ready for the plow, lie idle in this state. Along our most prominent lines of transportation from Salem southward stretch these idle acres as far as the eye can sweep. From range to range of the hills that meet the horizon stretch these expanses of land upon which the farm houses can be counted upon half the fingers of one hand.

Transfer the scene to the city and idle men by the thousand throng the streets clamoring for employment and food.

No consideration of vested property rights under God's heaven should permit such waste as this. What are Legislatures and statesmen for but to correct such evident mistakes?

If it is Singletax or if it is Socialism to suggest that the state, if necessary, should change this condition by any action that shall be required to bring these elements of production together in relief of the greatest problem of the time, then we preach both or either that will most quickly bring the desired results.

But as a matter of fact, neither Singletax nor Socialism, by any application as yet suggested, will bring results with sufficient promptness and scope to meet the manifest requirements.

There are big, brainy men in Oregon, representing all phases of industry, who recognize this problem. They would gladly give of their time and talent to find a fundamental solution. They should be invited to do it, and do it now. They may be in the Legislature now in session. If so, they should act in this mighty matter. If not, they should be found on the outside and urged to act and act promptly.—Oregon Messenger.

BOYS MUST QUIT SHOOTING IN CITY

Game Warden Hills calls the Leader's attention to Sec. 20, of game laws, wherein is provided a penalty for shooting or trapping within the incorporate limits of any city or town. All towns, parks, school grounds, cemeteries or reservations are regarded as game preserves by this section of the law. He states that he has the names of Cottage Grove boys within his possession who have been alleged guilty of shooting protected game birds within the limits of Cottage Grove, and hereafter any violations of this kind reported to him will be investigated and prosecution will follow, unless permission to shoot hawks, rats or other destructive birds or animals has been obtained from an officer.

There is also a city ordinance providing a penalty for shooting within the incorporate limits of Cottage Grove without permission of the city marshal.

Dog Owners Notified.

E. C. Hills, deputy game warden, has notified more owners of dogs to tie their animals up because they are suspected of running deer or destroying the young and nests of game birds. In the latter instance, Mr. Hills has served notice on Lon Heitzman, Will Baker, Will Snyder and Arthur McDowell, living west of Irving. Others notified are: F. E. Taylor, Thurston; Ben Jackson, Walker; Tom Miller, Saginaw; Chas. Conner, Cottage Grove; Pete Withers, Irving.

TELEPHONE RATE OF ONLY 25 CENTS

Oregon City, Or., Jan. 27.—The lowest telephone rate in the United States is said to be that of the Beaver Creek Telephone Company, which serves 270 subscribers at 25 cents a month.

Since the company was organized the rate has never exceeded 25 cents. Each subscriber buys his own instrument and pays his share for the installation of division lines. The company has 26 divisions. The officers are: President, Abel Thomas; secretary, E. W. Smith; treasurer, Albert Mehnke.

FARMER DISCUSSES THE GAME FUND

E. R. Shumway representing the farmers union at Milton made the following statement before the committee on fish and game laws at Salem last week. "We protest against this argument that the sportsmen of Oregon shall have all the say as to what shall be done with the game fund money," declared Mr. Shumway. "I represent an organization of 4000 farmers, and I am a farmer myself, and we believe that as taxpayers and citizens of this state, we are entitled to have some voice in saying what shall become of the game fund money.

"The farmers of this state help to feed the game birds and they also suffer without complaint when their fruit and grain is damaged by pheasants and other similar birds. We believe that turning the game and fish money into the general fund will not work harm to the wild life in this state. We have enough confidence in this legislature to believe that they will appropriate enough money to afford the needed protection to fish and game. If there is one class of people to whom the game belongs it surely is the farmer.

"The farmer wants to know where this money received from fish and game is spent. If the game fund is more than enough for the protection of the fish and game, then we claim it ought to go into the general fund."

DEATH OF FORMER COTTAGE GROVE GIRL

Mrs. J. Glenn Craig, formerly Miss Ruth Gertrude Taylor, the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. P. G. Taylor of Drain died at Lexington, Ore. Jan. 25, 1915, aged 20 years. She attended high school in Cottage Grove for 2 years and graduated from the high school at Drain in 1912. While at Cottage Grove she united with the Christian church and lived a consistent Christian life. She was married to J. Glenn Craig, Sept. 5, 1912, and a few months later moved with her husband to Cecil, Oregon, where he was employed by the O. W. R. & N. Co. When he was promoted to Section Foreman they moved to Lexington, Oregon, where she was employed as Station Agent for the same company, remaining there till the time of her death.
