Please tell me the names of the Barbary states and on what powers they depend.

Algeria and Tunis to France, Tripoli to Italy; Morocco is nominally independent.

What is the exact meaning of sea level as the term is used in stating altitudes? Is there any difference in the sea level of the Atlantic and the Pacific oceans?

The phrase means the level that the sea would assume if the influences of winds and tides were eliminated. This does not mean an average of the highest and lowest tides, but the average height of the water as determined from all stages of the tide. As the ocean is in a constant state of ebb and flow from the tides, very careful and numerous observations are necessary to determine its mean or average level if there were no tides. The mean sea level is the same in the Atlantic and Pacific oceans.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

Considerable building activity is expected in Lebanon this summer.

Linn county expended \$161,943.95 in improvement of its highways during 1914.

The Hood River commercial club is interesting itself in the improvement of a city park.

A short course for Klamath county farmers and their wives is to be held the week of February 22 to 27.

Bids for the construction of the \$122,000 Pendleton postoffice will be opened at Washington, D. C., March 25.

Fully 1000 men, representing the retail interests of the whole state of Oregon, met in Portland Monday to attend the annual convention of the Retail Merchants' association.

Seven tons of acclimated seed corn will be distributed to Oregon farmers along the lines of the O-W. R. & N. company, commencing March 1, by C. L. ("Farmer") Smith, of that company.

Two boys, each about 19 years old, giving the names of Jack Anderson and Frank Riley, are in the county jail at Eugene charged with burglary of the jewelry store of L. Weiss in Eugene.

Captain R. W. Collins, U. S. A., Coast Artillery Corps, instructor of officer, left Eugene Monday for his third annual inspection of the Coast Artillery Corps. He was accompanied by Adjutant-General White.

With six cow testing associations carrying slightly more than 3000 dairy cows on official test, dairymen of Coos county lead all counties of the United States in this progressive plan of building up the dairy herds.

Forty-eight accidents were reported to Labor Commissioner Hoff during the week, but there was no fatality. Fifteen accidents occurred among the men engaged in lumbering and logging, and 13 among railroad employees.

The house has appropriated \$365,000 for the Umatilla reclamation project, and \$377,000 for the Klamath project. Twenty-five thousand dollars has been appropriated for fire protection of lands involved in the Oregon & California land grant suit.

George Isackson, of Portland, has received the contract for the erection of the postoffice building at The Dalles, at a price of \$79,558. The construction will be of sandstone. The building will be two stories above a basement 70 by 78 feet.

The success of the Powder River Gold Dredging company in its operation of dredges in the Sumpter district, has led to the adoption of this means of saving the values at several old placer properties, including that at Gold Center in the Sumpter district.

Taking the remarks of an I. W. W. speaker as an insult to Americans, M. J. Parcells, a soldier from Vancouver barracks, knocked the speaker from his stand at Fifth and Alder streets in Portland and started a small riot which was only quelled by the timely arrival of the police.

Governor Withycombe has granted a conditional pardon to Earl Shorogen, 17 years old, who is in the Marion county jail. He was arrested February 4 on the charge of stealing a pulley and log chain which he sold for 50 cents. He was convicted and sentenced to a term of 30 days.

The district forester at Portland announces that during the fiscal year 1914, there were 521 timber sales made from the national forests in Oregon, and 142 from the forests in Washington. This represents 24,594,000 feet board measure for Oregon and 199,146,000 feet board measure for Washington.

The largest property sale closed last week in the state involved the transfer of the Ben Harrison mine, located in the Greenhorn district not far from Baker, to the American Smelting & Refining company for a consideration understood to be about \$500,000. About 40 men have been employed at the mine, which produces approximately \$15,000 a month when in operation.

As spring comes on it becomes more and more apparent that there will have to be more reseeded in Umatilla county than was thought a few weeks ago. Farmers whose first examinations led them to believe that their grain was not damaged by the cold weather are now admitting that some of their fields will have to be resown. The lack of moisture in the ground resulted in much freezing out during the cold snaps.

President Kerr, of the Oregon Agricultural college, has announced the appointment of guides for the Oregon building at the San Francisco exposition. These men were selected by a committee, which took into consideration the scholastic record of the applicants, their appearance and personality and the knowledge of the state of Oregon as indicated by the answers given to questions asked in a recent examination. Lectures were given by a number of members of the faculty, preparing the applicants for the examination. Out of about 300 men who applied for appointment 120 were allowed to take the examination and 38 were appointed. In addition 22 alternates were chosen.
