Chas. Smith was up from Saginaw Thursday and presented the Leader with a copy of the Cottage Grove Leader of 1905. Among the liberal advertisers in its columns at that time were: Pearce & Johnson, grocers; Welch & Woods, gents furnishings; Garman & Hemenway, general merchants; D. C. Baughman feed store; Piper & VanDenburg, hardware; Griffin and Veatch, hardware; Pacific Timber Co., general store; Hartung & Hansen, flour and feed; Currin & Veatch, general store; Potts & McQueen, Fashion Stable; Hemenway & Burkholder, general store, and, strange to relate, not one of the above named firms are in business here today. The only advertising in this paper of 10 years ago looking natural is Bartels Meat Market, Benson's Pharmacy; Lurch's store; Joe Baker's blacksmith; and the cards of Drs. Job, Kime and Petrie. The other newspaper here then was the Bohemia Nugget. From a business and advertising standpoint the papers do not make as good a showing today for the town as they did 10 years ago. The town has doubled in population and assessed valuation of property, and the country tributary has developed in proportion. There are more people and more business, but the business is not all kept at home. What is needed most now is for the town to wake up, get out of the pessimistic rut and go after business, new industries and manufacturing institutions. The business is here. Let us go after it and get it.

PROHIBITION RUINED

RUSSIA? SURE MIKE!

M. Kharitonoff, comptroller of the Russian treasury, speaking before the duma budget committee, declared that owing to the great increase in the national savings, due to Prohibition, the extraordinary outlay occasioned by the war had caused no suffering as yet in Russia.

As proof of this, Mr. Kharitonoff said the national savings in December, 1913, which amounted to 700,000 roubles (\$350,000), had increased to 29,100,000 roubles (\$14,550,000) in December, 1914. He added that the total saving for 1913 amounted to 34,000,000 roubles (\$17,000,000), as compared with 84,000,000 roubles (\$42,000,000), for 1914.

WILL INSPECT

NATIONAL GUARD

Captain R. W. Collins, U. S. A., Coast Artillery Corps instruction officer, left Eugene Monday for his third annual inspection of the eight Oregon companies of the Coast Artillery corps. He will be accompanied by Adjutant General White. It is the fourth annual inspection of this national organization, of which Col. Creed C. Hammond is commander with headquarters in Eugene.

Each company will be inspected under close-order infantry and artillery drills, using the equipment in the armories. A close inspection of the officers, non-commissioned officers and all the members of the company will be made, and an inventory of the federal property taken and examination of its condition made. The local inspection date is February 19, Company 6, at Cottage Grove.

Questions and Answers.

What was the date of final suppression of the Indian mutiny?
The mutiny of native troops or sepoy revolt began in 1857. That year was the Hindu 1914, centenary of Plassey. Astrologers had predicted that the power of the East India company would terminate that year. A new kind of greased cartridge, containing the fat of pigs and of cows was introduced into the army, and being considered a sacrilege to Hindus and a defilement to Mussulmans, was made the occasion of revolt. First blood was spilled at Barrackpur in March. Then followed Cawpur, with its terrible massacre, the famous siege of Lucknow and its relief by Havelock, the British siege of Delhi and numerous affairs and battles. One method of suppression was to blow captive sepoys from the mouths of cannon. One of the principal leaders of the sepoys was the renowned Nana Sahib. The last great battle was fought at Gwalior in June, 1858.

Did England supply guns to the Confederates in the civil war?
Early in the war large shipments of guns from England reached Confederate camps. As late as 1864 an English firm sold Enfield rifles to the Confederates at \$17.50 each, payable in cotton.

When was the first conscription or draft law passed in our civil war?
How many were drafted?

The conscription law was passed March 3, 1863, and after some preliminary the draft was made on the 6th of October. The law provided for the enrollment of all able bodied citizens between the ages of twenty and forty-five years, and the total enrollment was 3,113,305. There were more than fifty causes or grounds of exemption from the draft, mostly physical, and in addition to this any person who was drafted became exempt by furnishing an acceptable substitute or by paying \$300. About 40 per cent of the men examined were enrolled; about one-half of those enrolled paid the commutation of \$300; about two-thirds of the remainder furnished substitutes and the other third went to the field in person. The total amount of commutation money received from those who "paid out" was \$10,518,000. The number of substitutes furnished was estimated at 132,680 and the number of drafted men who went to the field 98,043.

What is the meaning and origin of the word "welcher" in stock transactions?

It is a Wall street slang for a debtor who takes advantage of the law to evade the payment of a debt which, though not enforceable in a legal way, is an honorable obligation. The word is also an English racing term descriptive of a man who fails to pay his debts.

GOLD FOUND IN FLOOR SWEEPING

Florence, Ore., Feb. 8.—The extracting of gold from the sand in and around Florence is becoming more and more recognized as a valuable industry for the territory. Not a day passes that pedestrians following the ocean beach from the cape do not report favorable results from men engaged in the washing of gold. Travelers arriving here are compelled to walk over the sand hills approaching Florence. They always carry more or less sand on their clothing and footwear and the lobby of the Bay View Hotel is the receptacle for this sand from the guests' wearing apparel. Owing to the constant reports of the richness of the ocean sands, W. J. Clarke, proprietor of this popular resort, has been testing out the values and from the tests made from the sweepings of the lobby floor he claims from one to two dollars per day is realized.

Mr. Chas. Goolock arrived today from the upper beach and reported mining of beach sand is progressing favorably and says miners engaged along the beach are realizing one dollar per hour for their labor.
