LONG ILLNESS FATAL TO JACOB HANSON

J. Hanson, an employe of the Southern Pacific Railroad at Cottage Grove and a resident of Oregon for 38 years, died early Saturday in the company's hospital at San Francisco after an illness of nearly three years.

Mr. Hanson came to Oregon from Norway and settled in Cottage Grove to take charge of the wood-preserving works for the Southern Pacific Railroad. He was 62 years old. His widow and two daughters, Christina Hanson, of Cottage Grove, and Mrs. Katharine Swennes, wife of Detective Swennes, of the Portland police department, survive him. The family reached San Francisco four hours after Mr. Hanson died.

Mr. Hanson was a member of the Hassalo Lodge, Independent Order Oddfellows, in Portland.

The body arrived at Cottage Grove for burial Monday evening, the funeral service being conducted from Mills chapel this Wednesday afternoon by Rev. MacLeod of the Presbyterian church, interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

What proportion of the world's cotton crop is produced in the United States? What other countries raise cotton?

The United States produces more than half of the world's crop every year. In 1908 this country produced 13,000,000 bales out of a total of 19,000,000; in 1909 it produced 9,800,000 bales out of 16,942,000; in 1910 of 18,711,000 bales the United States produced 11,483,000; in 1911 of 22,151,000 bales it produced 15,546,000; in 1912 of 21,817,000 bales it produced 13,696,000.

The next largest producer to the United States is India, which in 1912 produced 3,518,000 bales, with smaller crops in Egypt, China, Russia, Brazil, Mexico, Peru, Persia and Turkey. Every year we export nearly twice as much as we consume at home.
