Baltimore, Feb. 18.—The Scrip-

Europe, which he said was terri-
ble.

"We cannot grasp its magni-
tude or what it means," he said.

tures are being fulfilled—'Nation
shall rise against nation, and
there shall be sorrow throughout
the world, and then shall the end
come.'"

"Loss of life in great numbers
occurs only once in a while. But
now, in this greatest war in the
world, a thousand—nay 10,000
are being sacrificed every hour
the war continues."
