The second partition, in Jan nary, 1793, was effected by Russia and Prussia. Russia annexed \$5,000 square Sam Swengel of Minadoka, miles and a population of 4,000,000. treaty signed Nov. 25, 1795, divided Poland among Russia, Austria and Germany as it existed up to the begin ning of the present war.
