Did Abraham Lincoln ever make prohibition or temperance speeches?

Prohibition was little known or thought of in his day, but he was a lifelong total abstinence man. In an address delivered before a Temperance society at Springfield, Ill. Feb. 22 1842, he said: "Whether or not this world would be vastly benefited by a total and final banishment from it of all intoxicating drinks seems to be not now an open question. Three-fourths of mankind confess the affirmation with their tongue, and I believe all the rest acknowledge it in their hearts."

When the victory shall be complete—when there shall be neither a slave nor a drunkard on the earth—how proud the title of that land which may truly claim the birthplace of both of these revolutions that shall have ended in that victory." In an address to the Sons of Temperance at Washington, he said he had made temperance speeches before that society was organized, "and I think I may say that to this day I have never by my example belied what I then said."

Where does the Lincoln highway start and end? What states does it pass through?

The highway is a proposed transcontinental road which will connect the Atlantic coast with the Pacific, being of more benefit to Nebraska than to any other state. It begins just outside of New York city and ends at Oakland, Cal., passing through the intervening states almost in a straight line.

## TO ASK FOR MORE FISH FOR COUNTY

More fish for the Lane county streams this summer are wanted by E. C. Hills, deputy state game warden, who has asked the sportsmen of the county to co-operate in a fish census which he will take for a second time this year. He has asked the fishermen to report to him the numbers taken out each month.

He did this last year, and before June 1 he had reports of the catching of 124,823 trout. In June some 8,478 fish were taken out of the river by those who reported to him. While this number does not amount to a complete list, it gives an indication of the number of fish which must be replaced each year.

"I expect the game commission to plant large numbers of trout in the McKenzie and Willamette rivers this year," stated Mr. Hills today. "Last year I showed them how many fish were taken out, and I think the numbers will be increased. Because of the planting of fish the fishing was good all last year, and it has been good so far this year, considering the weather."

Last year Lane county received 241,780 fish out of some 6,267,810 trout planted in Oregon. Lane county also received considerable money from the state game fund for hatching fish. The McKenzie river hatchery received \$1,262; the Crescent, Odel and Davis Lakes work received \$1,331; the Siuslaw \$285; and Triangle lake received \$332. This does not include new construction, under which the McKenzie river hatchery led all other projects with \$1,824.

Mr. Hills adds that of the \$5,425 paid in bounties on wild cats, \$258 went to Lane county. Lane county also received the bounties paid on 24 cougars and four wolves.

## NOW TIME FOR APPLE SPRAYING

Now is the time to spray for apple scab and the codling moth, according to C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector.

"Either of the following formulas may be used for apple scab for the first spraying and should be put on under high pressure as soon as the bloom buds have separated in the cluster and show pink.

"Lime-sulphur solution at rate of three gallons to 100 gallons of water.

"Bordeaux mixture, 5-5-50; that is, five pounds of copper sulphate dissolved in water, five pounds of stone lime slacked, to fifty gallons of water.

"Bordeaux mixture should be made fresh as it deteriorates rapidly.

"In using keep the material well agitated and wet all foliage as an apple scab will attack the leaves as soon or sooner than the fruit."
