## KILLING IN WAR A REPULSIVE PASTIME

Continued from First Page

Could you have refused to shoot  
under the eyes of the lieutenant?  
War is killing, and that's all  
there is to it. Suppose every  
soldier in the French line were to  
obey his own instincts about killing.  
None of the enemy would  
die. The French have brought  
you here to kill, and you must  
kill, whenever you can."

Technically, I had done wrong,  
because all war is terribly wrong.  
I sat behind a machine gun one  
day soon after that and killed  
eleven Germans who had built a  
barricade in some nearby trees.  
They were shooting at us, and I  
felt much better about killing them  
than I did about the single  
German.

And then, later, again on the  
bicycle seat of a machine gun,  
and at the rate of seven hundred  
shots a minute, I fired at advancing  
columns of German soldiers  
in close formations and watched  
them drop and squirm. They  
were coming to kill us, if they  
could. It was only fair to kill  
them, under the rules of the war  
game. A terrific sense of power  
filled me, the rattling of that gun  
was sweeter and grander to me  
than the hallelujah chorus. I  
knew what it means to be drunk  
with killing. Other machine guns  
were going, too, but I felt at the  
time as if mine were the only  
one. The Germans turned and  
ran, their formation smashed,  
their dead and wounded  
strewn the hillside.

But that night after I had  
crawled into my mudhole hut to  
sleep, I didn't dare to think of  
the women and children whose  
hearts had been hit by that ma-  
chine gun fire.

I had joined the French for-  
eign legion expecting to be made  
a member of the flying corps.  
Instead, I had found my way to  
the trenches, where killing was  
our job—brutal out-and-out kill-  
ing, with but little science and  
less chivalry.

When my chance came I got  
out. Of the 1500 men I had  
started out with, only 384 re-  
mained and we had been in the  
trenches only 47 days.

I quit because it was living hell.  
Everybody else would have quit,  
too, I know they would. I lived  
with them, and slept and ate with  
them and talked with them, and  
I know they would have quit, if  
they could. So would every oth-  
er man in all the armies, in all  
this great war.

When the word runs along the  
lines, some happy day, that the  
war is ended, I don't want to  
have to write the story of how  
the men feel. Only God will be  
able to measure the joy—no hu-  
man being would be able to tell  
it.

## AUSTRIA DECLARED MAKING LAST STAND

Vienna Reports Sanguinary En-  
gagement but Says Enemy  
Was Repulsed.

London.—That the Russian advance  
into the Carpathians is gaining ground  
is asserted by Petrograd, while Vienna  
says the enemy has been held in check  
after sanguinary fighting.

The defense of the Carpathians is  
the last effort Austria-Hungary can  
muster, says the Times correspondent  
with the Russian forces, telegraphing  
from Lvoff, "and if her troops fail  
there nothing can prevent the Russian  
invasion of Hungary."

A description of conditions under  
which desperate fighting is carried on  
in the Carpathians, says a Berlin dis-  
patch, is contained in a dispatch to the  
National Zeitung from its special cor-  
respondent, who says that not only is  
the terrain tremendously difficult,  
but that it is so broken up by moun-  
tains and forests that the conflict re-  
sembles guerrilla warfare on a colos-  
sal scale.

Unable to see parts of the territory  
involved, combatants often find it ne-  
cessary to abandon a position gained  
a heavy loss because its view is cut off  
from other sections of the battle line.  
Although the Russians are constantly  
bringing up fresh troops and making  
terrible sacrifices, the correspondent  
says, their onslaught has been checked  
at Dukla, where the Austrian line runs  
southward to the crest of the Carpa-  
thians.

The Russians have been devoting  
their attention for several days to an  
effort to force back the Austro-Hun-  
garians in the Middle Pass, between  
Lupkow and Uzsok passes. The Teu-  
tonic allies there, the National Zeit-  
ung says, have long been contending  
against greatly superior numbers, but  
nevertheless "accomplishing wonders  
of endurance and bravery."

### BULGARIANS ATTACK SERBS

Roaming Bands Cross Frontier, Tak-  
ing Two Cannon and Positions.

Rome.—Bands of Bulgarians have  
made an attack on the Serbian fron-  
tier, according to dispatches received  
here.

A Serbian blockhouse at Volandovo  
was attacked, the dispatches declare.  
The Bulgarians captured two cannon  
and occupied positions in the hills on  
the left bank of the Vardar river. Tel-  
egraphic communication with Saloni-  
ka has been interrupted since the re-  
ports were received.

The report of the attack made by  
the Bulgarians caused grave concern  
in diplomatic circles. It is generally  
believed that Italy's entrance into the  
war is certain in case of an attack  
being made upon Serbia by Bulgaria.  
The belief was expressed that Bulgaria  
would hasten to disavow responsibility  
for the action of isolated bands upon  
the border.

### German Torpedo Sinks Italian Ship.

Genoa, Italy, via Paris.—A German  
submarine has sunk the Italian steam-  
er Luigi Parodi, which left Baltimore  
January 22 with a cargo of coal for  
Genoa, according to word received  
here. The report has caused a pro-  
found impression here, and there are  
many expressions of resentment.

### Turks Destroy Big Battleship.

Berlin, by wireless to Sayville.—A  
report received in Berlin from Athens  
says the British battleship Lord Nel-  
son stranded inside the Dardanelles  
straits, has been destroyed by the fire  
of the Turkish guns on shore.

## BRITAIN ANSWERS GERMAN PROTEST

London.—The German protest and  
threat of reprisals on account of the  
treatment by Great Britain of the pris-  
oners taken on board German subma-  
rines was made public here. This  
protest was transmitted by Germany to  
Great Britain through the United  
States.

The reply of Great Britain also was  
made public.

The German government asked  
whether Great Britain intended to ac-  
cord less favorable treatment to cap-  
tured German submarine crews than  
to other war prisoners. Germany said  
that if Great Britain adopted such a  
course British army officers held pris-  
oner in Germany would receive corres-  
pondingly harsh treatment.

The foreign secretary, Sir Edward  
Grey, in his reply, said that the pris-  
oners from German submarines had  
been segregated, but were being treat-  
ed humanely.

### Scotch Plants Taken Over.

Glasgow.—The motor manufacturing  
plants in Scotland were taken over by  
the British government to be operated  
night and day, that the army motor  
output may be increased.
