GERMANY AND COPPER A SERIOUS PROBLEM

The ammunition used by modern armies depends on the supply of copper. There is no substitute. In the present war, therefore, the quantity of copper in Germany, which is shut off from the copper-producing countries, and which produces relatively little copper itself, becomes a matter of prime importance.

A Swiss expert in the use of copper has recently estimated that the Germany and Austrian armies daily fire away not less than 309 tons of copper above the amount that they recover, or 112,000 tons a year.

Germany has been producing only 28,000 tons of copper a year, and Austria almost none. Germany cannot possibly produce more than 40,000 tons. The chief copper country is the United States which produces far more than all the rest combined.

Its output in 1913 was 612,000 tons. Japan, which ranked second, produced 80,000 tons. Germany has been importing about 200,000 tons a year, mostly from the United States and that supply has ceased.

Germany sees the danger and feels the pinch. The price of copper there has tripled since the war began. The attempts of the government to get copper through neutral countries, its confiscation of the metal in all forms in Belgium, its dismantling of electric light fixtures—those are only a few of its efforts to relieve a situation that it must find more and more embarrassing as the war goes on.

COMMUNITIES STUNG BY CHEAP PAVING

At Oregon City and Spokane fights are raging over cheap forms of paving.

That is something no community should tolerate, the various kinds of cheap paving.

At Salem and in other cities are miles of paving of the cheaper grades in ruins.

The clamor of the property owner for something cheap is a delusion and is very expensive.

There is only one worse form of infliction and that is the paving put down by a lot of politicians.

Municipal paving plants have bankrupted more communities than any other form of public ownership.

In Ohio and older states the people have learned that only the best and highest priced pavements are worth laying.

Hundreds of miles of country roads in Ohio and the middle states are put down in vitrified brick on concrete.

On the Pacific and Atlantic Coasts the best grades of bitulithic pavements, or the still more expensive wood blocks are laid.

Cheap pavements are an abomination that no community ever gets stung with a second time.

Important Labor Case In Courts.

The suit of Peters vs. Dorcas Bros., is of great interest to farmers generally.

Hop pickers were promised 20 days work and a short crop only gave them 10 days.

They sued the employer for the ten days difference which amounted to \$10,000.

The political press and labor unions all sided with the plaintiffs. The judge who tried the case left the bench and fawned on the witnesses to flatter the labor vote. The case involved the liability of any farmer or fruit grower who might have a short crop. But a jury of farmers and business men made short work of it and disallowed the claim.
