Death of Well Known Blacksmith.

Phillip Hohl, a well known and highly esteemed citizen of Cottage Grove, who established a fine home and prosperous blacksmith business in this city, died Monday morning, May 10, 1915 after a protracted illness, aged 59 years, 6 months and 19 days. Deceased was born in Germany, but came with his parents to Milwaukee, Wisconsin, when only six months of age. He was united in marriage to Miss Barbara Henry a native of Wisconsin, at Milwaukee, Jan. 18, 1877, and to this union eight children were born, all of whom are living. The family came west in 1890 and settled in Eugene where they resided for 12 years and then came to Cottage Grove in 1902 where they have built up a home and a large blacksmith shop. Mr. Hohl having learned this trade and followed it from the time he was 14 years old. Mr. Hohl also had timber interests in this part of the state. He was a very industrious, progressive and worthy gentleman and was highly esteemed by all who knew him. Funeral services were conducted from the family home this Wednesday afternoon by Father J. A. Moran of Eugene, interment in the L. O. O. F. cemetery. Besides a bereaved widow there is left to mourn their great loss the following named children: Henry Hohl of Los Angeles, Calif.; Mrs. J. H. Jackson and Mrs. Mike Wald of Eugene; Mrs. Clarence Hess of Roseburg; Geo. Hohl of Springfield, Phillip, William and Leonora Hohl of Cottage Grove, all of whom were present at the funeral service except Henry Hohl of Los Angeles.

BRIEF WAR NEWS

Three civilians perished as a result of the bombardment of Amiens by a German Taube.

England experienced three hostile air raids within 48 hours, but they resulted in no loss of life, and no serious damage to property.

According to reports which reached Basel, Switzerland, from Berlin and Vienna, Emperor William has ordered the principal of the German generals and also some of the Austrian commanders to meet him in a grand conference in order to plan the coming summer campaign.

In one of the most brilliant bayonet charges of the entire war, French chausseurs have carried the summit of Schneepfennethkopf, overlooking the Rhine valley, in Alsace, the French war office announced.

The French have again been active in the Vosges, capturing an important height near Metzeral. The British, too, have attacked the Germans in the neighborhood of Ypres, where fighting still was in progress when the last report was dispatched.

Great Britain tightened her hold on southern Babylonia by defeating a force of 15,000 Turks who attempted to outflank the British positions along the Tigris river.

Activity prevails along the western battle line, but seems to partake of the nature of isolated engagements instead of a general offensive. Artillery duels have taken the place of fierce hand-to-hand fighting, which has been the feature of the recent struggle along the Meuse and near the Lorraine border, but the latter type of combat continues in the Vosges, where the official statements of both sides agree sharp fighting is taking place on German territory.

Petrograd continues to report minor successes in the Carpathians, showing that the fighting has not been entirely suspended near the passes, but the Russian, Austrian and German official reports agree that spring has virtually put an end to all activity along the remainder of the eastern front.
