LIBERTY BELL TO COME VIA OREGON

Philadelphia, May 5.—Accord-
ing to plans made by the council-
manic committee in charge of the
trip of the Liberty bell to San
Francisco, the relic will leave
here on July 3. Stops will be
made by the special train on
which the bell will be carried at
Chicago, Topeka, Kansas City,
Omaha, Cheyenne, Denver, Salt
Lake, Ogden, Huntington,
Spokane, Seattle, Portland and
Roseburg.

High Prices in Mexico.

Since the shortage of flour has
been so acute in the Mexico there
has been a run on every kind of
crackers, both of the local and
imported brands. Soda crackers
are to be found in very few stores
today, and sell at \$10 for a
square tin box, even for the local
product. The 10-cent boxes of
sea foam or saltines, for which
the housekeepers formerly paid
60 cents, and felt very much
abused, now are held at \$2.50 in
a few stores where they still
have a few boxes in stock. Eng-
lish sweet and fancy crackers
and biscuits sell for from \$10 to
\$20 a box.

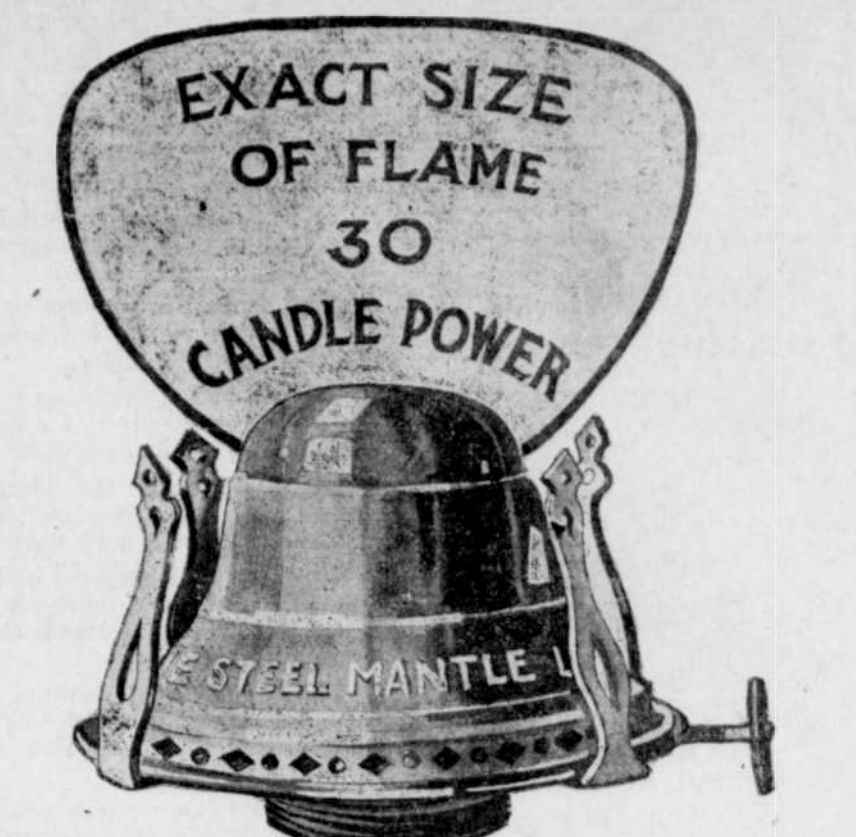
