Bandon has sold \$14,000 bonds
for a new school house.

Forest Grove will improve
streets with macadam at \$1.00 to

days on account of the war.
Other stops were made at Ping-
yang, Hongkong, and a second
delay on account of war disturb-
ances was occasioned at Shang-
hai, where their vessel was tied
up 13 days. They next sailed
to Nagasaka, Japan, crossed that
country by rail visiting all of the
principal cities, all of which were
very beautiful, declared Miss
Mildred, the famous Japan cher-
ry trees being in full bloom. The
next voyage was from Yokoha-
ma, Japan, to Honolulu, Hawaii,
during which trip Mildred says
she was seasick for 9 days. A
rest in beautiful Honolulu was
much enjoyed she says, and
then came the last stretch of the
long journey, from Honolulu to
San Francisco, over a turbulent
and stormy sea, the lower decks
of the great liner being washed
almost continually by heavy seas.
Arriving at San Francisco, May
3, only four days less than three
months journey from India, one
day was spent at the Exposition.
Here Mildred was left by her
traveling companion Miss Hare,
whose home is at Fresno, Cali-
fornia, and she then boarded the
Shasta Limited for Cottage
Grove, arriving here May 6, just
one day less than three months
from the time she sailed from
Calcutta, India. Aside from be-
ing a little tired Miss Mildred
was none the worse for her trip
around the world, but she assur-
ed the Leader editor that she
was delighted to get back to
healthful, balmy and fruitful Ore-
gon again.
