A call to all Italian citizens of
the United States to enroll for
service in the war against Aus-
tria and Germany was issued
Monday. The military law of
Italy holds that all men of Ital-
ian birth in this country are sub-
ject to call for service in the ar-
my regardless of whether they
have taken out citizenship papers
in the United States. Penalty
for refusal to obey the call is im-
prisonment in the event of a lat-
er return to Italy.
