At the Dalles June 3d county
court opens bids on \$20,000 high-
way work.

The Moser cherry crop has
been sold at \$90 per ton.

North Bend orders Virginia
avenue improved to cost \$11,000
Child Industry—instead of only
restraining children give them
something to do.

Eagle River plant completed to
operate Virtue mine at Baker
City.

Eugene factory promotion com-
mittee considering manufacture

erations this week, cutting 50-
000 feet a day, at Wheeler, Ore.

At Eugene Oregon Power Co.
employing 25 men laying gas
mains. \$40,000 city hall bonds
sold at premium.

Suit of workmen injured on
logging train for \$2500 damages
dismissed by Judge McGinn, as
man got \$84 benefit under the
industrial compensation act.

Salem school board refuses de-
mand of central labor council that
only union labor be employed in
erecting new school buildings.

At Rainier H. C. Mowrey has
purchased plant which will be
known as Mowrey Lumber &
Timber Co. Planing mill being
installed, dock facilities improv-
ed, sheds being extended, and
plant to operate soon.

Resolution was adopted by re-
gents of Monmouth Normal
School that new \$50,000 training
school building be built and
equipped of Oregon material and
manufactures, and that trimmings
be of Oregon stone.

Snook & Traver awarded con-
tract for McKinley school at
Salem at \$20,128 on open shop
basis. Building Trades Council
demanded that board accept
higher bid and employ only
union labor, which was refused.

Total per capita taxes at Port-
land \$45.41. Total taxes, \$36-
328,000. County Assessor Reed
estimates this sum would buy
food and fuel for 82,380 families
of five persons each for one year.
The tax burden equals the labor
of 29,230 men for one year.

The O. W. R. & N. announces
that construction work, entailing
the expenditure of \$1,000,000 will
be undertaken immediately. It
will include new terminal facili-
ties at Walla Walla, new division
headquarters at The Dalles, com-
pletion Coyote-Echo cut-off in
eastern Oregon and the estab-
lishment of another terminal at
Pilot Rock Junction near Pendle-
ton.

Postmaster General Burleson
has announced that by the end
of the fiscal year, June 30th, the
rural free delivery mail service
will be extended to one million
new patrons without increasing
the present cost of delivery. This
is to be accomplished by the re-
adjustment of routes and the use
of motor cars. Congress author-
ized the use of motor vehicles
after July 1st, next. This will
be an important factor. Changes
were authorized last month that
reduced operating expenses \$177-
644. This saving has been uti-
lized to establish 263 new routes,
serving approximately 135,205
persons. In the same period, ex-
tensions aggregating 104 miles
have been made. These exten-
sions serve approximately 6,010
persons.

BLAME'S PLANETS FOR MUCH RAIN

The planet Jupiter and not old
Jupiter Pluvius, is responsible
for the heavy rain storms now
prevailing and the outbursts of
Mount Lassen and the volcanoes
in Alaska.

There was a quadratic con-
junction of Venus and Jupiter
May 19, and a quadratic opposi-
tion of Mercury and Jupiter May
22, and there have been other
combinations of the planets, with
Jupiter, in the past few weeks,
all of which tend to make atmos-
pheric conditions far from agree-
able. Jupiter is the boss planet.
Its mean diameter is about one-
tenth of that of the sun and
about 11 times that of the earth.
Jupiter takes about 11 years for
a complete revolution around the
sun and this recalls that in 1902-
1903 there were a lot of distur-
bances when Jupiter was in ap-
proximately the same relative
position to various planets as at
present.

Jupiter, with some of the other
planets, have such a strong
pull that they have raised blis-
ters on the sun—sunspots, and
the earth is affected by the
spots. On May 25 and May 31
there was more complications
in the planetary system which
will cause storms in June and
July.

This is the astronomical dope
which Prof. Albert F. Porta, of
San Jose, figured out several
weeks ago and from his calcula-
tions he predicts that the last 10
days of May would show storms
along the Pacific coast, making
navigation dangerous, and he
predicted that Mount Lassen and
other volcanoes would be in
eruption, and thus far the pro-
fessor has hit the nail on the
head.—Portland Telegram, May
26th.
