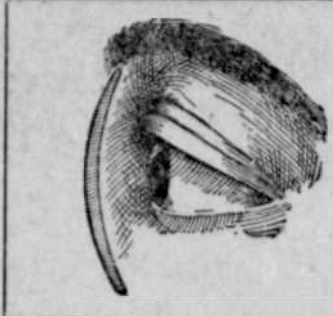

VERDICT FOR DEFENDANT.

SCHOOL ELECTION

For that reason another election will be called and held, at which the voters will be permitted to adopt or reject the budget.

CONSTRUCTION IS STARTED ON ALASKAN ROAD.

Washington, June 22.—Actual construction of the government's Alaskan railroad has been begun. Lieutenant Mears of the Alaskan engineering commission reported to Secretary Lane today he had established his base of operations at Ship Creek, Cook's Inlet, and was landing materials and supplies. Building of wagon roads, one of the first requisites of the railroad construction, is under way and the force on that work will be increased to 2000 as soon as facilities can be provided for bringing material to employ that number.

MANY PRIZES AT FAIR GIVEN TO GOVERNMENT.

San Francisco, June 23.—The United States government exhibit at the Panama-Pacific exposition has been awarded 28 grand prizes and 31 medals of honor. It was announced here yesterday. These are the first awards ever received by the United States for its representation at any exposition, as heretofore the government has not entered into competition for prizes. The government's exhibit at the exposition embraces all branches of its activities and is the most extensive participation the nation has ever made at any international exposition.
