"Mr Lyons you may stand up. Have you any thing to say why sentence should not be pronounced in accordance with the verdict given by the jury who tried your case and found you guilty of murder in the first degree.

"I don't know what made me do it, I didn't mean to kill him. I think it was partly Mr Smith's fault for mot coming in, I was waiting for him to come in. I don't know why I did it," said the condemned

WESLEY'S BIRTHDAY

HOW METHODISM WILL CELEBRATE FOUNDER'S BICENTENARY.

Commemorative Services to Be Held All Over the World-Chiengo's Extension Plans - New York Built First Methodist Church.

Methodism is deeply interested in the approaching two hundredth anniversary of the birth of the founder of the church, John Wesley, and from all over the world come notes of preparation for the celebration of the event.

In Chicago an elaborate international celebration is being planned to take place next May which will extend over a week of time. All the Metho-dist institutions, led by the Northwestern university, have joined in the move ment, and President Edmund J. James of the university has been appointed chairman of the committee of arrange

It is intended to make the Chicago celebration a climax to the movement which has just resulted in the raising of a \$20,000,000 church fund. Chicago recognized as the headquarters Methodism in this country, and the church's strength lies in the middle west, and for that reason-it is felt that the bicentennial celebration should be made international in its scope.

The first bicentenary event, how-ever, will be held at Carnegie hall, New York, on the evening of Feb. 26 under the auspices of the Metropolitan thank offering commission. President Roosevelt will make the principal address of the evening, and Bishop Edward G. Edwards and Chancellor James Roscoe Day of Syracuse university will also make addresses. This bicentenary has excited the greatest interest all over the country, and the demand for tickets has exceeded the capacity of the hall by many thousands.


