

**McKinley Memorial So. Avenir.**

Postmaster at Cottage Grove has received from the McKinley National Memorial Association a limited supply of the certificates which have been prepared for distribution to contributors to the monument for as souvenirs of their participation in that great enterprise. The certificate is a beautiful work of art on which is given an excellent reproduction of Mrs. McKinley's favorite likeness of her husband, together with a picture of the McKinley home in Canton and of the White House. The wording below the illustrations is as follows: "This certifies that \_\_\_\_\_ has contributed to the fund for the erection of the national memorial at Canton, Ohio, in honor of William McKinley." The workmanship and artistic effects are of the very highest order, the great house of Tiffany & Co., New York, being the designers and manufacturers. The supply in the hands of Postmaster at Cottage Grove is a portion of the first edition of the certificates and is sent here to enable those who have not as yet contributed to do so. Parties who have already identified themselves with the movement will receive souvenirs direct from the office of the Association or through local committees.

**Look After the Orchards.**

Now that Spring is here and the buds will soon swell and burst into bloom, it is time for the fruit grower and orchardist to look after his trees. Pests will develop which, if not killed early, will spread over entire orchards and from one orchard to another, doing incalculable damage. The production of smooth-skinned, unblemished, properly colored fruit should be the aim of every grower. It can be done in but one way. Take proper care of your orchard. Nature does the rest.

**Requests of H. W. Corbett.**

The will of the late H. W. Corbett was admitted to probate in Portland last Saturday. By its provisions Mr Corbett gave liberal amounts to several charities, they being as follows: Presbyterian Home Missions \$25,000; The Home, Portland, \$50,000; The Boys and Girls Aid Society, \$10,000; The Portland Y. M. C. A., \$30,000; Presbyterian Board of Relief for Ministers and their Widows, \$25,000; Portland Academy \$25,000; Portland Art Association, \$50,000, in cash and a lot; To establish a home for old ladies, \$15,000. The balance of his estate, which is estimated at \$3,500,000, is bequeathed to his wife and other relatives.

P. freight agent at Portland, a free rate from all points in Douglas county and also from Cottage Grove in Lane county, on all agricultural and mining samples sent to the Roseburg Board of Trade for exhibition purposes. Newlands, Who Succeeds Jones, Is Rated as a Millionaire. Francis G. Newlands, who has been elected to succeed John P. Jones as United States senator from Nevada, is at present a representative in the house. Senator Elect Newlands is a native of Mississippi and is a Yale graduate. He studied law and was admitted to the bar of the District of Columbia. He married the daughter of Senator

Sharon, the mining king of Nevada, and became a citizen of that state in 1888. Newlands became interested in the silver agitation and for a long time was vice chairman of the national silver committee. He was elected to the Fifty-third congress and has ever since been re-elected.

He is largely interested in real estate and street railroads in the District of Columbia and is very rich. He is now classed as a Democrat and will act with that party in the senate. Mr. Newlands is in his fifty-fifth year.
