CAPTAIN OF A BATTLESHIP.

Autocrat Who Rules Great Craft Has Appalling Responsibility.

Over the vast establishment rules the captain in supreme and isolated authority, says Lieutenant-Commander Greaves, U. S. N., in the World's Work. All his accomplishments must be those of the seamen, for he directs the movements of the ship in all evolutions, and his decision upon all professional points is final. His responsibility at all times is grave and exacting. In time of war it will strain the stoutest nerves; in the hour of battle it is nothing short of appalling. when he stands alone in his conningtower, having control of all the tre mendous forces lying latent in his ship only to be released at the proper ment by a touch of his hand.

He is the guiding spirit of an enormous projectile of 15,000 tons that rushes through the water at a speed, it may be, of fifteen knots, and he Coming down on the elevated road knows that the slightest mistake of his head or heart may mean a national dis-

But besides being the navat and military chief of the establishment, he is a lawyer-a kind of justice of the peace, as it were, who holds court every morning, investigates reports of misdemeanors and assigns punishment to the guilty. The delinquents are brought to the "mast"-the quarterdeck-with their accusers. sides are heard and swift judgment usually follows. In this capacity it will be noted that the captain is court, judge and jury. Not infrequently he acts as clergyman, and as such is the bishop of the diocese, acknowledging no ecclesiastical superior, reading the services on Sundays, officiating at the burial of bis dead, in the old days, occasionally marrying lovers.

He always messes alone. His generous quarters are entirely separate from those of the other officers, and at the door of his cabin stands a marine sentry day and night, and none may enter without first being formally announced. When he comes on deck to leave the ship in uniform, or when he comes on board, he is escorted to the side by the executive officer and officer of the deck, the guard is paraded, four boys attend at the gangway, the bugler sounds the silence and every one on deck stands at attention as the boatswain pipes him cheerily over the side.

A COBBLESTONE CHURCH.

Following the close of the Civil war the Baptist so ciety in that vulage diss-lved and two years ago the Rev. William J. Noble a graduate of Brown University, organized a new society and set about the erection of the present church.

MAKING BOWLING BALLS.

Hardest Wood Known Comes From the Central American Forests

The popularity of bowling has grown to such an extent in all parts of the United States that the manufacture of bowling balls, pins and alleys has become an industry which gives employ ment to thousands of workment. While the work of constructing the alleys does not require any great amount of ingenuity it is in the shaping and modeling of bowling balls that great skill and careful workmanship are required.

Bowling balls are made almost exclusively out of a wood from the West Indies and Central American countries known as lignum-vitae, one of the hardest woods known, says the Philadelphia Press. There are several agents in these countries buying up this wood all the year round. It is shipped in the rough for the factory in chunks about four to six feet in length and varying in diameter from six to twenty inches.

The logs are put into a specially constructed cylinder and cut into blocks, after which the edges are rounded with a band saw. The rough balls are then turned over to expert mechanics, who, with the aid of turning lathes, gradually plane them down to the required

The balls are then smoothed with sandpaper turner, receive a coat of shellac and oil and are complete, with the exception of the finger holes, which are frequently bored to measure.



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
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
